**New Parsonage Is Dedicated.**

A large crowd was present at the undenominational temple Sunday to assist in the dedication of the modern, three-room parsonage which is nearing completion and which will shortly be occupied by the pastor and his wife, the Rev. and Mrs. S. F. Pitts. Mr. Pitts was assisted in the services by the Rev. Mr. Glenville, pastor of the Evangelical church at Wichita, and the Rev. Mr. Simmons, of Montavilla. Many were in attendance from Portland. A trio, consisting of two ladies and a gentleman from Wichita, rendered musical numbers which were much appreciated.

The new parsonage is 21 x 24 in size, and faces the north just at the rear of the temple building. It is modern in every respect, with electric lights and bath. It has not been decided at this time whether the cooking arrangements will be controlled by gas or electricity. The interior is practically completed, but the outside yet remains to be sided and the house painted. Practically all the work on the house, with the exception of the plumbing and plastering, was donated by those interested.

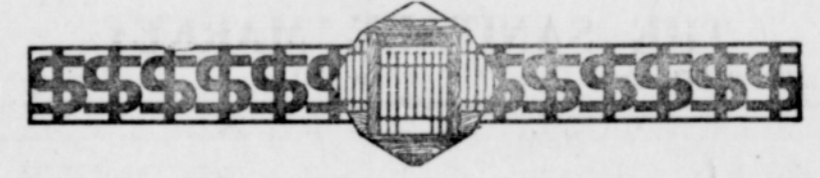
