RISE IN CULTURAL LEVEL.

Though taxes are high and getting higher, says the March Sunset, the bulk of the increase is for education. In this connection the following statistics are given:

Since 1900 the number of pupils in the public elementary schools has increased 44 per cent; in the public high schools it has increased 574 per cent. There are now enrolled three and a half million high school pupils as against less than 700,000 in 1900. In the universities and colleges the enrollment of 1924 exceeded 700,000, an increase of 272 per cent in 24 years. Nearly a quarter of the population, twenty-five millions, went to schools of one kind or another last year, and the total of the educational bill approached two billion dollars.

Congress has passed the postal salary increase measure. The measure provides for a wage increase averaging about \$300 a person annually, effective as of January 1 last, and has increased postal rates effective April 15 next. The rate increase should raise about \$60,000,000, nearly enough to meet the wage advance. It is believed the president will sign the bill.

Republican leaders in congress have agreed to select Representative W. C. Hawley of Oregon as chairman of the republican caucus.

The Oregon legislature, after a session which overran by six days the stipulated period of 40 days adjourned late yesterday. It is claimed the late session has been conservative, and has worked with unusual harmony in enacting legislation which means a constructive program for the state.

The republican legislature has made itself trying to Oregon's democratic governor but Pierce has made the best of the situation and has held the whip hand in several instances.

It was up to the legislature to provide nearly a million dollars for state expenses not provided for in regular taxes or otherwise and that presented a hard problem. A tax on tobacco was the solution.

YOUR INCOME TAX.

No. 9. Losses arising from fires, storms, shipwreck, "or other casualty," or from theft, whether or not connected with a taxpayer's business, may be deducted from gross income in his 1924 income tax return. If his home or automobile is destroyed by fire or his property damaged by storm, the loss is deductible for the year in which it was incurred. Loss of property by theft or burglary is an allowable deduction, and need not be incurred in the taxpayer's trade or business. A loss from embezzlement is also deductible.
