
POWELL VALLEY

Mr. and Mrs. Charles Simmonson were pleasantly surprised Sunday by about ten old friends who came out from Portland for the day. They

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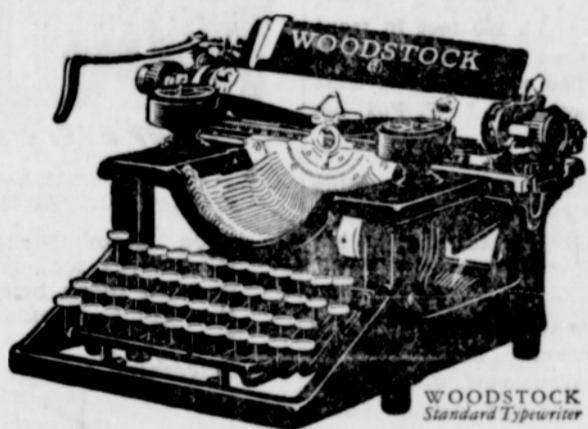
