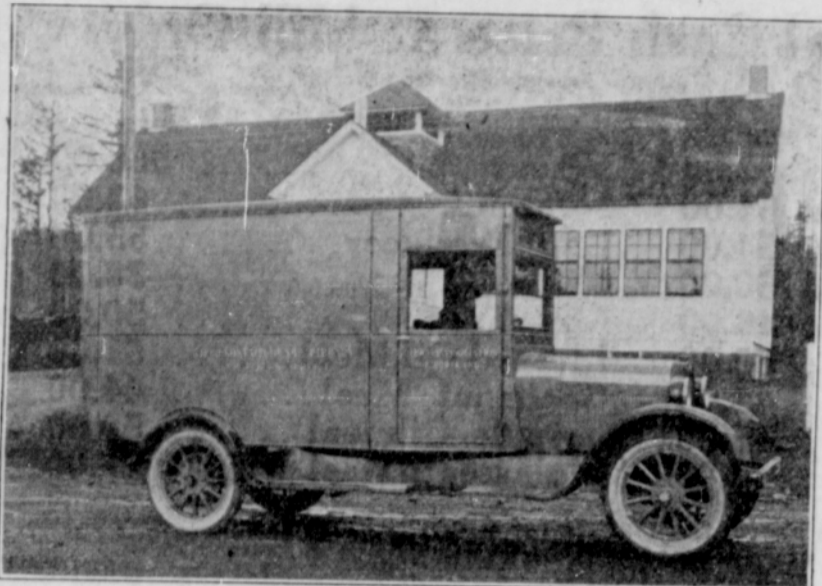

project, which is financed by library tax funds granted by the board of county commissioners, is no longer an experiment, but on the contrary, is a great asset to the educational interests of the county.

Multnomah county ranks high in rural club work and employs two club

leaders who keep the boys and girls interested in agricultural and domestic projects.

The county health nurse and a competent assistant examine each child in the rural schools at least once a year. The Schick test for prevention of diphtheria has been given to more than 150 pupils in one of the schools and was financed by the Parent-Teacher association of the district. Special nutrition work has been carried on with the assistance of interested volunteers.

HOME ECONOMICS WORK DRAWS LARGE CROWD

The various communities in which the home economics work specialists of the extension service are holding meetings are very enthusiastic over the work and the meetings are well attended. Two of the communities are meeting with Miss Lucy A. Case on nutrition this week, Powellhurst on March 17 at the schoolhouse and Pleasant Home on the 18th at the church.

The Pleasant Valley women are meeting with Miss Cooley, sewing specialist, for a millinery school at the church on March 19, 26, 27, this being a three-day school. Women who are interested in attending this school should plan to be present all three days and should equip themselves with the following articles: pin, full package, needles, milliner's if possible, thread, tapeline, thimble, shears, tailor's chalk, pencil and paper. Women are asked to bring all the old hats they can find in their attics, and covering fabrics which they may find in semi-worn taffeta or satin dresses, georgette blouses or petticoats, also what trimmings may be stored away. In case any woman wishes to make an entirely new hat, she should secure a buckram or rice net hat frame to cover. Buckram, crinoline, brace or frame wire and wire clips and pliers should be supplied if work in frame making is desired.
