**ROCKWOOD**

The new law enforcement film, "The  
Triumph of Justice," will be shown in  
connection with an address by the  
Rev. R. E. Close, assistant superin-  
tendent of the Anti-Saloon League of  
Oregon in the grange hall at Rock-  
wood on Sunday evening, April 5, at  
7:30 o'clock. This film has been pre-  
sented in other nearby localities

trict has been razed and transferred  
to the Rockwood site where it is now  
beginning to undergo construction.  
The building to be erected is to have

be known as the Rockwood Commu-  
nity Methodist church. Ohmit broth-  
ers are in charge of the building of  
the new structure. It is thought that  
most of the lumber in the old Iliff  
church can be utilized in the new  
building. The Iliff church was erect-  
ed at Cedar in 1907, the same year that  
the Gresham Methodist church was  
built. It received its name from a  
wealthy lady in Denver who donated  
the means for its erection in memory  
of a deceased daughter, Miss Harriet  
Iliff. The Rev. J. H. Wood superin-  
tended the carpentry of the building  
and was the first pastor to occupy the  
Iliff pulpit. For various reasons the  
work did not prosper in this locality,
