BACKERS ARE SECURED FOR LYCEUM COURSE

A contract has been signed with the Ellison-White Lyceum Bureau for a course to be given next winter in Gresham. The numbers will be by nationally known lecturers and entertainers and it is a distinct honor to this district to secure such speakers.

Three numbers will be given, the first by Edwin Whitney, founder and head of the Boston School of Expression, in November; Charles Paddock, "the fleetest boy of all time," who ran 100 yards in 9 3-5 seconds, the world's record; the last, a lecture, by J. Franklin Babb. These are considered as choice as any to be obtained by the largest cities of the United States.

The school may add two numbers, making a course of five. The high school will cooperate with the guarantors to the extent of furnishing an orchestra and auditorium and taking care of the sale of tickets. In return, the funds secured over and above the contract price of \$400 will be turned over to the student body funds.

Miss S. Stella Burcham, representing the Ellison-White Lyceum Bureau, acted as advance agent and spent nearly three weeks securing signers for the contract and arranging other matters.

Snow Deep on Watershed.

It is reported by persons recently returned from Bull Run lake that the snow is packed to a depth of 65 inches there in comparison to 36 inches at this time last year. According to reports of Charles E. Oliver, engineer in charge of the development work at the same time last year.

Mr. Oliver also states that because of heavy snow the trails would probably not be opened before the first of June, although last year most of the snow had disappeared in April.
