### FORMER SCHOOL GIRL HERE DIES AT BEND

Word was received Thursday evening of the death of a former Gresham Union high school pupil, Miss Beatrice Milne, who passed away at Bend, Oregon, yesterday at 2 o'clock in the afternoon. Miss Milne, who would have been 16 years of age had she lived until July, was the daughter of Mrs. Sam Peterson, who formerly resided in the Orient neighborhood. The girl's father, Robert Milne, died of tuberculosis several years ago. The deceased was a graduate of the eighth grade in the Orient school in 1923 and in September of that year entered high school at Gresham. However, she was not able to continue her studies on account of failing health and was obliged to quit school after about four months. In the fall of 1924 she was taken east of the mountains by her mother in the hopes of benefiting her health. Her death is attributed to a recent attack of the flu.

The funeral services will be held Sunday afternoon in the Methodist church at Gresham, at 2:30, in charge of the Rev. E. G. Ranton. Interment will be in Gresham cemetery. Funeral arrangements are in the hands of J. E. Gates, undertaker.

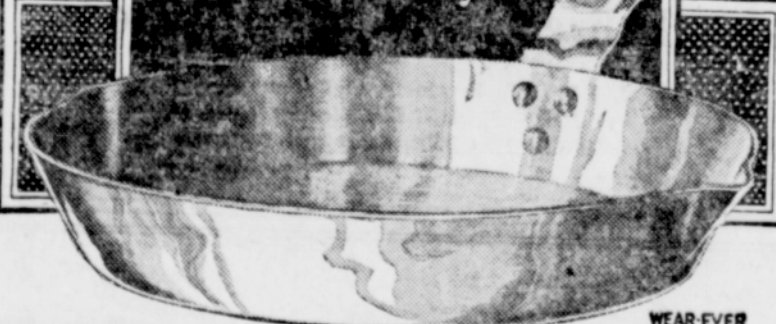
