GEORGE W. STAPLETON.

In the death of George Washington Stapleton Oregon and Multnomah county have lost an honored and distinguished citizen and Gresham an ever loyal and helpful friend.

By nature possessed of a large and strong physique, a massive and intensely active brain, a genial and sympathetic heart, he acquired by diligent study and a wide association with his fellow men a knowledge, wisdom and leadership which made him an outstanding, influential and successful citizen in whatever place or occupation he chose to devote his thought and effort.

Stapleton was always human and lived unselfishly to benefit his fellows. He made no profession or pretense. You had to take him just as he was, but he was genuine. That's why so many—everyone who knew him—liked him in spite of an outward roughness and brusqueness.

From what we have heard him tell of his boyhood environment it is remarkable that he overcame the handicaps and became the worthy and successful man so widely known and loved. He had it in him and no one ever fathomed his good qualities. He was generous. He was intensely patriotic. He was industrious. As a judge he never shirked but worked many hours, nights, holidays and Sundays, in order to understand and weigh the merits of the cases before him and render justice to all concerned.

His large place in Gresham and the county outside of Portland is known and appreciated by all. Aside from serving as mayor for several terms and being identified with practically every local organization and civic movement, he was again and again called upon to intercede with the powers that be to gain due consideration for some local improvement and he never failed. He was as ready to help the most obscure individual and many had reason to thank him for getting them out of trouble when in or keeping them out. He was always neighborly.

"Friend after friend departs, who hath not lost a friend?"

All who know him well enough to know the real George Stapleton can truly sympathize with his bereaved family for we all share in a common, human sorrow.

As the Portland Telegram well says in closing an editorial tribute, "His home town of Gresham received much of his personal thought and labor, always for the betterment of his neighborhood. Gresham will always hold him a friendly remembrance."

COUNTY "CLEAN-UP" WEEK.

This is clean-up week for the city of Portland and county of Multnomah, the main incentive being the fact that "company is coming" for the summer. Portland is expecting thousands upon thousands of distinguished visitors to her many conventions, besides the usual tourist travel, and all will want to see the best we have. That means auto travel over our main scenic highways and shorter trips over our country roads and byways.

Throughout the county, says Commissioner Taft, road supervisors and their crews are at work cleaning up the arterial highways and getting them in shape. One arterial route a day will be taken by the supervisors and the county has been divided into districts so the work may be done more speedily, County Commissioner Taft and City Commissioner Bigelow at the luncheon at the members' forum of the Chamber of Commerce yesterday urged the support of all of the members of the chamber in the work.

Robertson, now deceased, against the State Industrial Accident Commission of Oregon had been sustained on appeal and that judgment was affirmed in favor of the respondent, William Robertson, by the Honorable Justice Brown, judge of the supreme court.

The many friends of the widow, Mrs. Katherine Robertson, will be pleased to learn of this just decision in favor of her and her little ones. By the terms of the verdict she will receive the sum of \$30 a month and the two children \$8 each per month until they reach the age of 16 years.

Obey the Potato Law.

The grower or dealer who observes the new potato law will benefit himself and will not have to fear prosecution, says State Market Agent C. E. Spence. The law simply forces growers and shippers to state what kind of stuff they are selling, and to back it up with their name and address. No man putting up an honest pack will try to evade the law. There is a penalty of both fine and imprisonment for violation, and the legislature made it the duty of the state department to prosecute violators. Leaflets giving the new law and also the standard grades will be sent to anyone for the asking by the State Market Agent, 714 Courthouse, Portland.

Child Rescued from Drowning.

Julius, the 14-months-old-son of Mr. and Mrs. Ed. DePaape, living south of Troutdale on the Nelson ranch, had a narrow escape from death Monday evening when he fell head foremost into a sunken barrel containing 15 inches of water which was standing on the premises for ducks to waddle in. The mother had gone to the barn for a few minutes and on her return failed to find the baby. She at once began to make a search for him and going in the direction of the tub of water, noticed a small foot protruding above the surface. Frantically grabbing the child, she summoned Dr. A. W. Botkin from Gresham, who rushed to the farm and after employing numerous methods of resuscitation was rewarded by the child regaining consciousness, not fully however, for a period of nine hours. The doctor in attendance made the statement that when he reached the child, he was in a state of rigidity, but with good heart action. The mother considered the child had been in the water fully five minutes and it was only with great difficulty that respiration was fully established. His condition is now regarded as favorable unless complications set in.
