Dodge Brothers Set New Record.
Dodge Brothers have been establishing new high records continuously for several months, as compared with similar periods for previous years, but the record of the week ending April 11 is the best in the company's history, according to the latest information received by Hamlin & Hoss, authorized agents.
With retail deliveries aggregating more than 7,000, an average of more than 1,300 each production day, the best previous week was surpassed by several hundred cars. New retail orders exceeded the corresponding week of 1924 by 1,000, or approximately 19.7 per cent.

Although Dodge Brothers Motor Cars are now being built at the rate of 1,100 a day, both deliveries and new orders are some 200 a day in excess of production.
"Had dealers' stocks permitted, the number of deliveries for the record week would have been even greater," it is said.

HIGH SCHOOL NOTES.

Last Friday at the high school was one of the banner days in its existence. More than 100 eighth graders were present and from every appearance enjoyed themselves immensely. Several of them came at 9 o'clock in the morning on the school busses and at 10:30 assembled in the gymnasium to consider their courses of study for the coming year. Principal C. M. Quicksall of Gresham, J. R. Teeters of Orient, Elizabeth Canning of Lynch and Mrs. Anna Studley of Rockwood were present and spoke to the eighth graders. Adjournment was made from the gymnasium to the cafeteria where they passed in line as do the high school students. The freshman class furnished ice cream as a treat to the incoming freshmen class. At 12:35 assembly was called in the high school auditorium and Mr. Lawrence, chairman of the school board, Miss Canning, Mr. Teeters and Mr. Quicksall, also Mr. Cannon spoke to the eighth graders as well as the high school students.

Troutdale had eight students present; Orient, thirteen; Powell Valley, four; Boring, ten; Rockwood thirteen; Lusted, six; Lynch 8; Fairview, eight, and Gresham, twenty-four. Numbers by the high school orchestra and glee clubs were especially well rendered.

Mr. and Mrs. Whetmore, talented musicians who have traveled the entire country broadcasting and who have played and will play for the Columbia records, were present. They are experts on the trumpet. Mr. Cannon knew Mr. and Mrs. Whetmore in Corvallis several years ago and Mr. Whetmore organized the Corvallis high school band which has won the state championship for the past two years. It was indeed a treat to listen to these artists.

The yells and assembly singing were full of pep and displayed the true spirit of Gresham Union high. The assembly adjourned from the auditorium to the front lawn and Eugene Welling, president of the senior class of 1925, presented a three-arm bronze drinking fountain to the school district as the parting gift of the class, and H. G. Mullenhoff, a member of the board, accepted in behalf of the district. After the presentation of the fountain, the band played the "Star Spangled Banner" as the flag was lowered and the entire student body stood at salute. From here the students repaired to the baseball diamond where the sophomores and juniors played a close-score baseball game, the juniors winning four to three in an extra inning contest.

Music lovers will be treated to a short concert at the high school Wednesday at 12:35 when R. Stross, considered to be one of the world's greatest cornetists will be present to play, also Coulin Oboe, a soloist of the Elks band will take part.

The festivities incident to the class of the school year will be ushered in May 14 with the annual school picnic which will be held near the auto club building on the banks of the Sandy. On Friday night, May 15, the juniors will give a banquet to the seniors and on the following Wednesday evening, May 20, will occur the class night exercises. Elaborate plans are being made for this event which is always looked forward to with so much interest. The baccalaureate sermon will be delivered to the students on Sunday, May 17, by the Rev. John Beard, pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Portland. He spoke to the students on Washington's birthday at the high school and his coming a week from the next Sunday is awaited with much anticipation. The time of this service will be announced later. On Friday evening, May 22, the commencement exercises of the 1925 class will take place in the high school gymnasium.

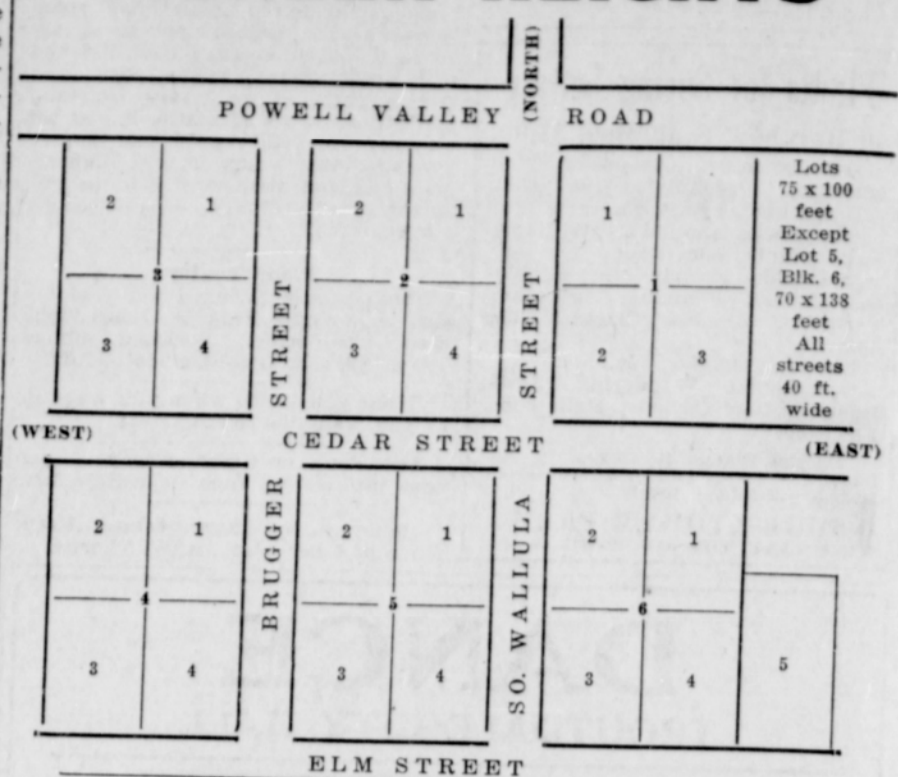
