A. W. Shipley Suffers Broken Leg.

A. W. Shipley was the victim of an unfortunate accident Thursday morning about 10 o'clock at the plant of the Sandy Lumber company where he has been employed for several years past, when a heavy timber which he was handling slipped and struck him on the leg, breaking the bone at the ankle. Mr. Shipley's work at the mill consisted of getting the timbers ready for loading onto a truck. A particularly heavy one had been put on a skid preparatory to conveying it to the truck. It began to roll and came with such force it bounced off the skid and struck Mr. Shipley on the lower part of the left leg, inflicting a clean break near the ankle, as shown by an X-ray picture of the fracture. A physician was summoned immediately from Sandy who took the injured man to his office there for treatment, and afterward he was removed to the Portland sanitarium where he expects to remain until probably the middle of next week. His doctor considers he will be laid up for possibly six weeks.

STIPULATION OF DISMISSAL.
In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for the County of Multnomah, K-6935.
