COUNTY GARAGE BURNS ON J. M. HILLYARD PLACE

A small but exceedingly spectacular fire occurred on the premises of J. M. Hillyard, who lives near Gillis station, about 5 o'clock Monday evening, when the garage housing the truck operated and maintained by the county in the road work of which Mr. Hillyard is a district road supervisor, burned to the ground entailing a loss of something around \$200. The driver of the truck, Malcolm Hillyard, had driven the truck into the garage and had closed the back door, bolting it on the inside, and had just started out the side door of the garage to go to the house when he saw a flame. It is thought a spark from the exhaust ignited with oil on the floor. At the risk of his life, the young man grabbed a heavy coat hanging on the wall of the building and wrapping it around him jumped into the truck and backed it out of the blazing structure. He sustained a badly burned hand while getting the truck to safety. There were in the garage 120 gallons of gas which exploded and helped to
