Manufacturers of automobiles, suffering as they did from over production last year, are now beginning to reap the reward of a more thoughtful business policy. They sharply curtailed production for the first three months of this year and awaited the call from the public. The call is now sharp and loud, so loud in fact that the month of April has a record production of 420,373 cars and trucks which is a little more than fourteen per cent in excess of the production in April one year ago.

The importance of this activity cannot be overestimated. It has a bearing on the nation's trade and labor in many other lines. The industry is now one of the most reliable consumers in huge volume of steel products, of copper, of lead, of zinc, of leather, of glass, and of rubber. It is absolutely the dominant factor in the consumption of oil products.

Unquestionably the market for cars has been stimulated by the extension of the time payment plan, which is healthy enough providing it be not overdone. But more important is the evident growth of our automobile exports. Only a few years back the standard of automobile merit in this country was the foreign car.

Today Europe has come to see the merit of the American product, and fortunately the American people have shown faith in the home product. The nation would be better off in many other lines of trade if the American people would make the words "Home Made" the standard of quality and excellence instead of buying without question whenever the magic word "Imported" is tacked to the goods.
