OREGON AND WHEAT EXPORTS.

The race for the position of first place among the customs district in the United States in the export of wheat is interesting. A report from the traffic department of the Port of Portland, for the fiscal year ending July 1, 1924, gives Portland as the leading export port of the United States in the export of American wheat. For the calendar year 1924, however, Portland had dropped to third position, being distanced by Galveston, Duluth and Superior districts.

In shipments of flour however there seems to be no variation, New York invariably leading the customs district in the export of this commodity with New Orleans second, Washington third, and Oregon fourth. Shipments from Oregon however are year by year becoming nearer those from the state of Washington and it is not improbable that they will ultimately pass the Washington shipments.

Spence, state market agent, and the producer who grades his products stands a far better chance for better markets. The consumer wants a guarantee these days and he will buy only of those who grade their stock and give him a choice.

Many a "healthy, good tasting" spring water, which was highly esteemed in the neighborhood, and which was even bottled for shipment, has been found to be contaminated and a prolific spreader of intestinal diseases, such as typhoid fever and dysentery.

Why It's Portland Cement. Many have wondered why the modern building-cement is called "Portland" cement. Here is the explanation. Cement was discovered by the Romans, who used it extensively for the foundations of their triumphal arches and temples. Excavations in the Forum clearly show on the concrete, marks of the ancient wooden forms, much as present day concrete shows the same patterns. As with Tyrian purple, the art of cement making was lost when Rome fell before the Vandals, and during all the Dark Ages and the Renaissance the secret remained buried.

But enough information remained so that some time prior to the American Revolution investigators in various parts of Europe began to make cement of varying qualities in a small way. The first notable use of cement in modern times was in the Edystone Lighthouse of the English coast. This was in 1756. It was also employed in the Erie Canal about 1820.

These cements were much like the Roman variety, which has stood for nearly 2,000 years. They were made of materials which nature had already mixed in the proper proportions. But in 1824 an Englishman, Joseph Aspdin, succeeded in making a stronger cement from materials which nature had not already prepared for him. This he called Portland cement, because it resembled a durable building stone from the Isle of Portland, used in building Westminster Abbey.

A highly developed form of this early portland cement is the cement of modern commerce, so that the secret of the ancient Romans in this instance has not only been rediscovered but also has been improved upon.

Henry Ford and Prohibition. "We believe that if the opposition to prohibition were analyzed it would be found that it was mainly alien. We believe that every true American is for it heart and soul. We believe that if prohibition were to be put before the nation tomorrow there would again be an overwhelming flood of public opinion in its favor. Although the friends of prohibition may not be so aggressive as its enemies, they are firmer in their convictions.

"It is not in the wide open spaces that the defiance of the prohibition laws is the most prevalent, but in the crowded urban centers where alien influence and alien eagerness for money-getting are at work. "After its five years of trial, prohibition is not a failure. It is the people who have neglected to correspond with it who are the failures. If it took Christianity hundreds of years to obtain a footing, why should anyone consider five years sufficient for a try-out of the greatest reform since the introduction of Christianity itself? The good that has already come from it infinitely outweighs the evil, and the evils that are, do not arise from prohibition but the failure to practice it."
