**PRIVILEGES OF KIDDIES GREATLY APPRECIATED**

The 19 children who have registered at the Kiddie Kamp since its opening on Monday are becoming accustomed to the regular schedules of play and rest and greatly enjoy the shady grounds of the Gresham grade school and the large, floored play shed. The children have quickly learned to be obedient to the teachers and helpful to them and to one another. Some of them are too young to make their wishes known in words and others cannot manage the intricacies of the English language, but they seem to feel quite at home in their new surroundings. Danish Canute, a sweet-faced little boy, does not understand fully what is said to him, but he warms up to the kindness of those in charge. Russian Edwin understands enough English to do quite well pretending to sell ice, and could not be induced to sell anything else. The babies are so sweet that all the children want to play with them and care must be taken that they are kept sufficiently quiet. "It is the nicest group of children we have ever worked with," said Miss Louise F. Shields, who is promoting the enterprise. Luncheon is served them at noon, with a hot dish each day, and sufficient milk is provided for them. Through the cooperation of local women who have assisted in the work, ticks have been made, which have been filled with straw, on which the small children take their afternoon naps. One of the rear corridors of the schoolhouse and one of the lavatories have been opened for the use of the kiddie kamp. A wire fence extending from the rear corners of the building prevents the children from wandering onto the road or the newly made lawn of the schoolhouse. Equipment is now ready for 100 children, and sufficient workers are available to care for that number. Parents who are interested are invited to visit the kamp and inspect it.

Miss Shields has placed Mrs. Lilla Bradford, former director of one of the Portland play grounds, in charge of the children. Miss Harriet Thayer, experienced with very small children, is assisting with the tiny ones. Miss Marian McClure of Gresham is detained at her home by an attack of tonsillitis. Her work in the play shed, directing in hand work, is being cared for temporarily by Miss Helen Griffin, daughter of the professor of mathematics at Reed College.

**H. P. ENGELS DIES AFTER LONG ILLNESS**

Peter Engels passed away June 26 at his residence after long suffering from paralysis.
