MOUNTAIN AND GORGE DESCRIBED IN BOOKLET

The Union Pacific has just made another valuable contribution to the big library of Oregon literature by the publication of a folder on "The Columbia River Gorge and Mt. Hood." It is in effect a 32-page album of the most elaborate and striking pictorial exhibits of which the photographer's art is capable and carries just enough text to clothe comfortably the heroic and amazing panorama which enrolls itself to the admiring visitor.

KIDDIE KAMP A PLEASING INNOVATION

One of the most interesting places in Gresham just at present is the premises of the Gresham grade school where the Kiddie Kamp, a most practical innovation and one of inestimable value to the berry workers, holds forth from 7 o'clock in the morning until 6 at night and seven days a week. Here for a nominal charge the kiddies under picking age have been properly and carefully cared for while the parents and older children have been engaged in assisting in the berry harvest. It is announced now by the management of the kamp that the special appropriation for the council of home missions has made it possible for it to offer its services to children of the berry pickers free of charge up to the closing time, which will be the end of next week.

Folks looking for a sure recipe to drive the blues and others inclined to be melancholy would do well to invest a few minutes of their spare time and take a trip down to the Kamp on the grade school grounds. There were 33 kiddies at the place on Wednesday, the day the correspondent visited them. One almost envied them. It was a hot day and here were inviting trees, a cooling breeze, swings galore, a smiling attendant telling the children it was time for a story. Away they scampered and seated themselves on the grass in anticipation of the story which was sure to be forthcoming. One tiny girl, Hazel,

was most prepossessing and familiar. She greeted the visitor by coming forward and taking her by the hand. One little chap, or was it a lassie? dressed in khaki coveralls, was crying lustily from homesickness and could only be comforted when hold of "dear teacher's" hand. However, the homesick ones were decidedly in the minority. There seemed to be something of interest new every minute for the youngsters. A young fledgling claimed their attention for a while, then when it had been placed in the grass to await the return of its mother, they turned to a game of drop the handkerchief.

Miss Marian McClure has been ill for a few days and during her absence from the grounds her place is being filled by Miss Harriet Knowlton, a student of Pullman College and whose father is a professor of physics at Reed. Mrs. Phillip Rossman, a member of the council of women for home missions, whose headquarters are in New York, is expected to visit the Kiddie Kamp at Gresham on Friday of this week. She is chairman for the Mission Study committee of the interdenominational church women and is visiting a number of schools and missions on the Pacific coast.
