NEW SETTLERS SEEK HOMES IN STATE

From all points of the compass, homeseekers come pouring into Oregon, according to a report just issued by the Portland Chamber of Commerce.

A total of 189 families, desiring to locate on Oregon farms, have been reported by the Gateway offices of Ashland and Ontario, Oregon; Green River, Wyoming; Portland municipal auto camp and the Los Angeles branch office of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, since June 1st.

Forty-one of these prospective settlers have called personally at the office of the Land Settlement department in Portland, and been given information and assistance in locating.

During the month of June, 24 families have already been located on the land in various parts of the state, representing a capital investment of over \$150,000. W. G. Ide, manager, states that complete reports for the month have not yet been received from the various counties, and that no doubt this number will be greatly increased.

FORMER GRESHAM RESIDENT BURIED HERE

Commitment services were held at the Gresham cemetery yesterday morning on the occasion of the interment of Mrs. Nettie Powell Williamson, widow of the late Dr. Walter T. Williamson, a prominent physician and who had been intimately connected with the earlier affairs of Gresham and who was also buried in the Gresham burial ground. Mrs. Williamson died last Friday at 895 Powell street in Portland at the age of 69 years, four months after the passing away of her husband. She had been in poor health for some time, but for only the past three weeks was she considered seriously ill. For three days of that time she had been unconscious.

Mrs. Williamson was one of the earliest settlers of this vicinity and had been prominently identified with the affairs of Gresham in earlier days. She was born and raised to young womanhood here and was popular among the young people of her day. A lifelong friend and chum of Mrs. Williamson was Mrs. I. McColl of this place. Their weddings took place on the same day in 1877, that of Mrs. McColl being solemnized first on the old Linnemann farm near Linnemann Junction and being witnessed by Miss Powell and her fiancé, the wedding party then repairing to the old Powell place which is now occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Charles Cleveland where the newly wedded couple witnessed the ceremony of Dr. Williamson and his bride. The two men they had married were also college chums, having taken their medical degrees together.

The friendships of these four persons continued and strengthened throughout the passing years. Dr. and Mrs. Williamson first went to San Francisco, staying but a few months, and from there they went to Weston in eastern Oregon where he practiced medicine for about nine years. From there he went to Salem where he entered the state hospital as first physician. Later they moved to Portland where the remaining years of each of their lives were spent. Since the death of her husband Mrs. Williamson has lived with her son, Dr. Hugh Williamson, cared for also by her sister, Mrs. Della Blaker.

She is survived by her son and two grandchildren, Josephine and Walter, also by four brothers and five sisters. The funeral services were held Monday morning at Finley's mortuary after which the remains were brought to Gresham to be laid by the side of her husband.
