MORE OPTIMISM NEEDED.

It is generally agreed that the economic condition of the farmers is not what it ought to be, and that it is necessary that it should be improved, for the general welfare of the country.

Excessive farm pessimism, however, is harmful to agricultural interests. The constantly proclaimed theory that farming has become an unprofitable industry, a "losing game," has served to depress farm values and restrict farm credit.

The political "friends" of the farmer who have been painting pictures of general bankruptcy in the farming industry have done agriculture immense economic harm.

Farm conditions are much better than they were five years ago, and they are steadily growing better. It is admitted that the farmer has been the chief sufferer from war time inflation and peace time deflation.

BUILDING HOMES.

Real estate experts tell us that building activities which are going forward all over the country constitute the greatest building program ever undertaken by any nation, ancient or modern.

The normal building program received a setback during the World War and, in some sections, we have not entirely caught up. Then the cities of the nation are developing rapidly and this is necessitating building improvements of various kinds.

Of course the giant buildings in the centers of the various cities are the most imposing when we figure up the financial totals, but it is even more satisfactory to consider the number of modest homes which are springing up in every progressive city and town.

People who formerly lived in down town tenement districts are now moving to the suburbs and buying homes. They can do this first because they are making higher wages and second, because the cheap automobile and the bus line have made it possible for them to get down from the outskirts of the city in a hurry.

This is a healthy sign and one which makes the development of the automobile worth while. The more homeowners and homelovers there are in America the less chance for the Bolshevik in the land of the free.

Poison the Cutworms.

At the present time the cutworms are doing a great deal of injury to the vegetable crops, cucumbers, potatoes and other tender field crops. They are worse this year than they have been for a number of years.

One of the best methods to control them is the use of a bran mash, made with 20 pounds of bran, 1 pound of arsenate of lead, or parisgreen, 2 quarts of molasses, the juice of one lemon, and about 1 gallon of water.

It has been reported from the state board of horticulture that 20,000 celery plants were lost in one night in the neighborhood of Troutdale from the ravages of the wily cutworm.

cutworms and has given good results in many places. The horticultural board has advised the use of the earwig poison for use in the campaign against the cutworm.
