

**EX-SOLDIER KILLS SELF IN HOSPITAL**

Gustav Johnson aged 30, was instantly killed about noon Monday by a plunge from the third story window of the United States veterans' hospital in Portland where he had been receiving treatment. His crushed body was picked up from the pavement by one of the hospital physicians, Dr. C. C. Campbell, who chanced to be walking in the street at the time, but the young man was beyond help when the doctor reached him. Mr. Johnson suffered an unfortunate accident last winter at Ryderwood, Washington, near Longview, when an immense log rolled on him, crushing him face downward into the earth. It was considered almost miraculous at that time that he survived the injury and his health has been impaired much of the time since. Johnson, who was an ex-service man, was admitted to the hospital Saturday suffering from a form of gastro-intestinal troubles and it is thought that brooding over his continued ill health led to the commission of the rash deed.

At noon Sunday the call was sounded for dinner and while other patients on the third floor responded to the call, Johnson lay on his bed fully dressed. After the others had left the room, apparently Johnson had removed the screen from the window, throwing it out of the window and had then leaped, breaking off a portion of the awning in his fall. The only known relative of the man is his brother, August Johnson whose home is in Powell Valley but who, with his wife, is residing temporarily at Ryderwood where he is employed. Funeral arrangements have not been announced.

**Emil Olson Robbed at His Home.**

Emil Olson, a retired business man and farmer aged about 65, was unceremoniously held up, his hands bound behind him and his mouth gagged at his home on the Troutdale road near the Base Line shortly after 1 o'clock Tuesday morning as he was preparing to retire for the night after spending the evening at the county fair in Gresham. He was forced to walk about a quarter of a mile to the Tollison garage to get someone to cut the thorns from his hands and give the alarm to the authorities. Mr. Olson is a well-to-do widower and keeps his home in the best of order, also dressing well himself and making a good appearance. It is thought this fact was not overlooked by some miscreant who was present at the fair the same night as was Mr. Olson and that he was followed to his home by the thief who watched a favorable opportunity to hold him up. At the point of a gun he was relieved of two gold watches, a Moose fob and \$70 in cash, after which the thug bound his captive's hands and put a gag in his

mouth. Deputy Sheriff Rexford was put on the trail of the holdup man, but aside from a bunch of keys found on the road, nothing has been learned which would lead to his apprehension.

**TIGARD GUERNEYS WIN HONORS AT COUNTY FAIR**

One of the most attractive exhibits in the cattle barns was a stall trimmed in purple and yellow and occupied by four typy prize winning Guernsey calves owned by Nave & Shainwald of Tigard, Oregon. Pictures of the mothers of the four young Guerneys and ribbons won at Tigard, McMinnville and Gresham added to the interest of the public. Queen's Prince Charming of Vista Grande, only three months old, was awarded a blue ribbon. Fairy Queen's Golden Princess, an extraordinarily beautiful six-months-old heifer, also received first prize. Jenny Wren's Proud King of Vista Grande secured second prize in competition with Lucilla's Golden Khedive, who was awarded first prize and championship. Golden Khedive was sired by Langwater Khedive, the noted bull formerly owned by W. A. Goodin of Cornelius, Oregon. Langwater Khedive is also a grand sire of the other three calves in this exhibit. Vista Grande Guerneys combine type and production to an unusual degree. The grand dam of Golden Khedive is Beth's Linda of Few Acres, champion four-year-old Guernsey of the state of Washington with A. R. record of 612 pounds of butterfat and 10,000 pounds of milk. The grand sire is Beauty XIV of the Fargette's Royal Knight, champion show bull of Tillamook county 1924 and winner of first at state fair and second at Pacific International a few years ago. Langwater Khedive's seven nearest dams average close to 700 pounds of butterfat and his sire, Steadfast, once sold for \$25,000 in the east. The blood of such great production bulls as Governor of the Chene, Langwater Holliston, Langwater Traveler, King of Medfield, etc., runs in the veins of the other three calves. The champion bulls dam, Linda's Lucilla of Monte Vista, won first prize at McMinnville in 1923. One of her noted ancestors was Lucilla of Chicono, noted show cow in the northwest years ago, one of whose bulls Loverbold, sold for \$1400 at one time at the Pacific International sale. Guerneys are destined to be one of the foremost dairy breed of the future, says Mr. Nave. They are quiet and kind in disposition, beautiful in appearance and produce golden colored cream of the finest quality. They are said to be the most economical producers of butterfat known and as milkers are second to none.
