PIONEER OF '52 DIES AFTER LONG ILLNESS

Mrs. Mary Preston, aged 85, a pioneer of 1852, passed away at 1 o'clock this morning at the home of Mr. and Mrs. B. W. Emery, where she has been cared for during the past few years. She is survived by three sons, James of Berkeley, California, George and Harry Preston of Kelso, Washington, also two sisters, Mrs. Carrie Costella of Spokane and Mrs. Annie Buker of Grass Valley.

Since coming west with her parents at the age of 12, Mrs. Preston has spent practically all of her life in this

vicinity, having lived at Fairview, Gresham and for a short time at Eagle Creek. Until the infirmities of old age came upon her, she was a leader in church and community interests and was a woman of great mental and physical vigor.

Funeral services will be held at the Methodist Episcopal church on Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Interment will be in the Gresham cemetery.
