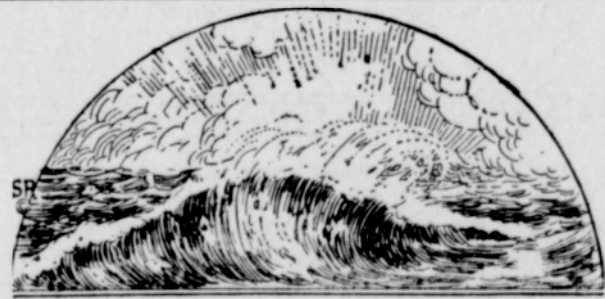

Sedan Demolished, Occupants Hurt.

An automobile accident occurred Wednesday afternoon about 6 o'clock two or three miles east of Orient as a Portland party of three, a man and two ladies were proceeding toward home after spending a day rounding the Mt. Hood Loop highway. They were traveling at a slow pace to take in the beauties of the surroundings when a roadster from the rear honked to go by them. In trying to pass them the car struck loose gravel and wheeled into the front machine, a Ford sedan. It was thrown over and badly damaged, the top being entirely demolished and all the glass broken with the exception of that in the back. The occupants of the machine came to Gresham to be treated for possible injuries, but after reaching here and consulting a short time with a physician, decided to go on to Portland for medical aid. Those in attendance did not regard them as seriously hurt. None of the names of the participants in the accident could be learned.
