FUNERAL HELD FOR LATE GUSTAV JOHNSON

Funeral services were held Thursday afternoon at Powell Valley Lutheran church for Gustav Johnson, 31, whose death occurred on Monday when he threw himself from a third-story window of the veterans' hospital in Portland. The Rev. Axel Green preached the funeral sermon and interment was in the Sandy cemetery beside the bodies of his parents and two sisters. He is survived by one brother, August Johnson, of Rydewood, Washington.

Gustav Johnson saw 22 months in the World War service and was under particularly trying circumstances, where his health was shattered by privations which he endured. He was first sent to San Antonio and later to Richmond, Virginia, without adequate clothing and in conditions which caused much suffering. He contracted rheumatism and when his outfit was sent overseas he was barely able to carry his pack on board. He was in great pain on the voyage and during the most of the time in the service. After returning home he went into the logging camps and last January at Rydewood, Washington, was terribly crushed by a tree, his skull and ribs fractured. He received internal injuries from which he never recovered. At times his mind was unsettled and it is thought that it was at such a time when he took his own life. He has been tenderly cared for and watched over since his accident by his brother, August, the only remaining member of his family. Gustav was free hearted and generous to a fault.

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
