Notice is hereby given that the Board of County Commissioners of Multnomah County, Oregon, will receive sealed bids for an issue of coupon bonds for \$500,000.00 of the tenor as follows:
Bonds shall be dated October 1st, 1925, and shall bear interest at the rate of four and one-half per cent per annum, payable semi-annually. These bonds shall be issued in denominations of \$1,000.00 each, principal and interest to be paid in gold coin, at the Fiscal Agency of the State of Oregon, in New York City, N.
