MISS SUDIE JACK DIES IN PORTLAND HOSPITAL

Miss Sudie Jack, for 18 years a resident of the Pleasant Home district, died at Good Samaritan hospital on Sunday morning after a month's illness. She had made her home with her sister, Mrs. Ella Schneider at Pleasant Home and in Portland for many years. She was the daughter of the late T. P. and Sarah F. Jack, Oregon pioneers, and the granddaughter of the Rev. Neil Johnson, an early pioneer circuit rider of the Cumberland Presbyterian church. She was born near Silverton in Marion county September 11, 1867. She is survived by two brothers, D. D. Jack of Pleasant Home and G. N. Jack of Red Bluff, California, and two sisters, Mrs. Ethel Hall of Willamina and Mrs. Ella Schneider of Portland.

Miss Jack had been in delicate health the greater part of her life, with occasional spells of sickness lasting for many months.

Funeral services were held this afternoon at the Pleasant Home Methodist church by the Rev. Wm. Fairweather. Interment was in the Pleasant Home cemetery. Arrangements were in the hands of J. E. Metzger, undertaker.

Corbett Resident Passes Away.

Mrs. Laura M. Carr, aged 67, passed away at her home six miles northeast of Corbett Sunday morning. Her death is said to be due to apoplexy, the result of gastric disturbances. Besides her husband, Amos Carr, she is survived by three children, Mrs. Nellie Hodgson and Joseph and Carl Gould. Mrs. Joseph DeShazer of Eagle Creek is a sister. Funeral services were conducted this afternoon at the Pounder cemetery where interment took place.

An interesting relic recently shown was the life insurance policy issued September 20, 1844, to Daniel Webster. It was for \$5,000 which was considered a large sum in those days and carried a premium of \$293. The policy mentions certain restrictive clauses, says the Detroit News. If Daniel wanted to visit a large city, Washington included, or journey west of the Mississippi river, he had to get permission of the company and pay extra.

But Webster did not go into the west of the Mississippi. He never had much use for that country. The idea of the insurance company in imposing the limitations was that smallpox was likely to be epidemic in the large cities, while the Indians were the hazard of the west.

Webster was also advised that if he died in a duel, was hanged or killed in a raid upon any city or Indian tribe there would not be any money for the widow.
