Mrs. J. R. Dellinger and daughter Thelma spent a few days visiting at the Geo. Parish home.

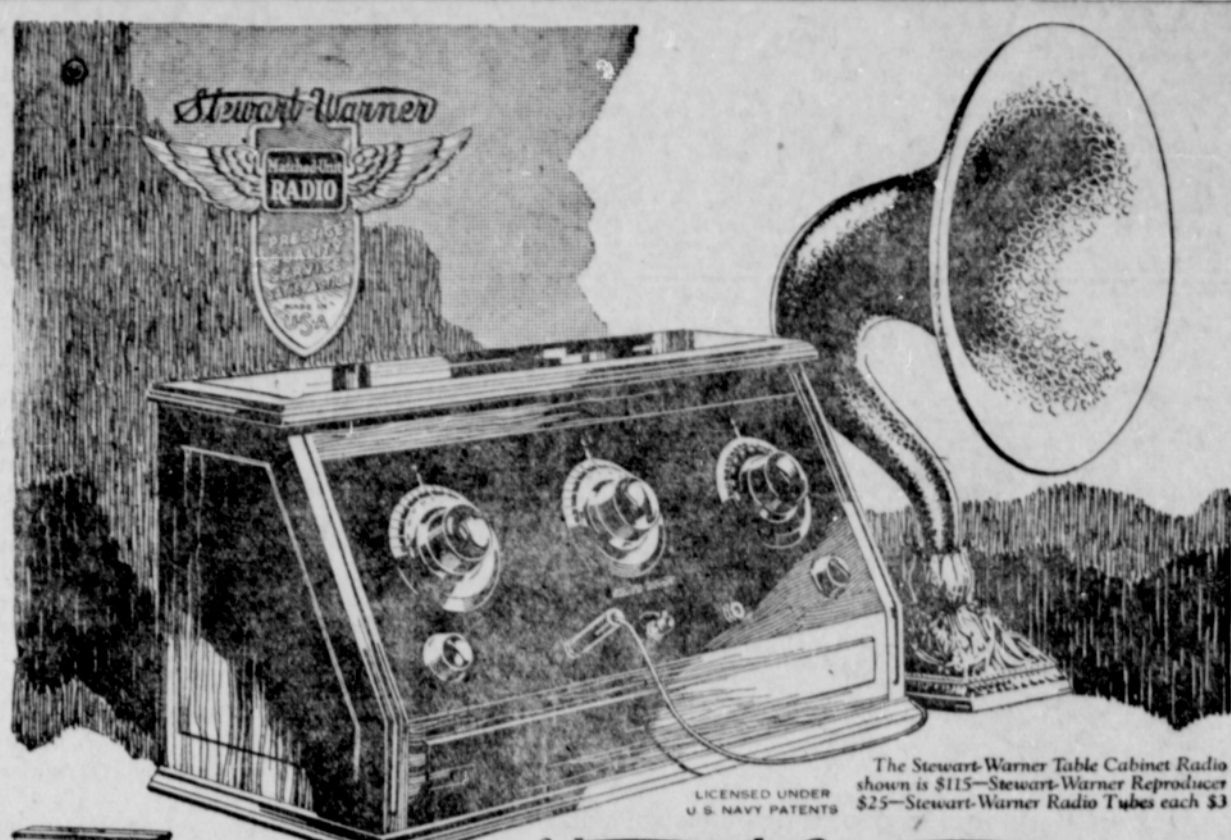
Mr. and Mrs. W. T. Hamilton of Astoria, Oregon, spent a few days at the T. Low home last week.

Mr. and Mrs. S. Stewart of Portland spent one day last week at the Tom Low home.



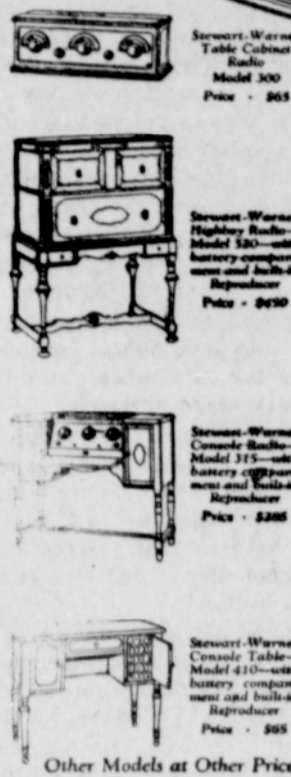
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POWELL VALLEY

The 10th annual meeting of the East of Sandy Pioneer society met last Wednesday at Columbia grange hall which had been decorated by the grangers for the occasion, with W. S. Woodard presiding. The forenoon was very pleasantly spent with greetings between neighbors and friends. At noon, there was a grand march led by the president and wife with Mrs. Ethel Smith Stewart at the piano, and the pioneers were led to the dining room where a bounteous banquet was spread which was enjoyed by about 250 persons.
