Your Throat.

Undoubtedly, in our struggle with the invisible enemies of mankind, we have been baffled by the invaders of the breathing-passages more than anywhere else. Here many of the deadliest germs attack. We have practically abolished typhoid; cholera is a thing of the past; smallpox is no more dreaded; diphtheria and scarlet fever are yielding; influenza, pneumonia and tuberculosis remain mysterious and unconquered.

It is known that disease-germs may reside for years in a throat that appears healthy, and annoys its owner but little. From this locality they wander to more remote tissues; an overworked joint, an idle gall-bladder, or an irritable kidney is fertile soil for immigrants, from a very modest throat-infection. Worst of all however, a diseased throat is more apt to infect the heart-muscle, especially in people past middle-age. I am safe in asserting that the majority of fatal heart diseases have their real origin in a perfectly curable throat infection, neglected!

Removal of tonsils is too often only a step in the right direction—merely removing the headquarters of the enemy. Millions of bacteria are left behind to continue depredations. The number of "poisoned hearts" from influenza-germs is appalling! It is in this field that an ounce of prevention is worth many pounds of cure. What better prevention than daily cleansing the upper air-passages with some harmless antiseptic? The invisible foe can be successfully combated, only when he is not deeply fortified. To neglect the throat is to court disaster.

Good Health Habits.

"Any act often repeated forms a habit and habits allowed steadily gain in strength. At first it may be but as the spider's web easily broken through, but if not resisted it soon binds with chains of steel"—Edwards. Good health habits are dependent on the power to show control over the common-place and ordinary situations of life. Habits may become assets or liabilities. Good health habits are assets that contribute to the well being of the individual, eliminating, bathing, are easily acquired and build up a wealth. Good habits usually spell good health. Habits that are detrimental to health are also easily acquired and constitute a growing liability which sooner or later reduces the efficiency of the individual. Many failures are due to bad habits. Good training makes difficult tasks easy while bad training makes a simple task difficult.

Health habits affect the whole life of the individual. Habits determine the active control of the whole human mechanism. Good health habits begin with the habit of right thinking. It is fundamental that right habits be formed in early life. Every one should be trained to meet the small problems of living and in this way power will be developed to meet the more weighty problems of life. Good health is dependent on regular habits of muscular exercise. The refreshing and stimulating habit of regular bathing assists in maintaining a healthy body. Deep breathing, our door living, moderate eating, moderate exercise and regular hours of sleep are the fundamental habits necessary to insure good health.

The only difficulty lies in overcoming the inertia of acquiring bad habits. After one has changed his habits, it is just as easy to live rightly as to live wrongly. Good health habits are not restrictive but liberating. Good health habits are simply a means of emancipating ourselves from our real limitation.

Cutting Down Expenses.

Are you one of those motorists who are afraid to take long trips for fear that something will happen to your car that you won't know how to repair? You needn't be, for all we know about motor vehicles has been gained by observation.

Some fellows seem to be always having engine trouble, while others are constantly fooling with their tires. Another keeps his left foot constantly on the accelerator and the other on the brake, yet this chap rages like a dog with hydrophobia when his car is towed back to the garage with a serious breakdown.

It would be a good thing generally if owners who are complaining about low gasoline mileage and blaming it on the quality of the fuel, would also examine carefully the condition of their engines. The condition of the cylinders, the tightness of the piston rings and the condition of the valves, all have their influence on gasoline mileage. If the cylinders are slightly scored, the piston rings loose and the valves seating improperly, it is no wonder that gasoline mileage is low, even granting that the present day fuel is inferior in quality to that which could be purchased two or three years ago.

If loss of power is due to a faulty carburetor adjustment, the trouble is more likely to be on the side of an adjustment which is too rich. The exhaust smoke is usually black or will have the odor of raw gasoline. A simple test is to shut off the flow of gasoline to the carburetor and allow the engine to run without touching the throttle. If the engine speeds up as the level of the gasoline drops in the float chamber, it is an indication that too much gasoline is being supplied under normal conditions when the chamber is full. Such a mixture causes not only loss of power, but also over-heating, carbon deposit, and possibly preignition.

It is not sufficient to know that the generator with which an up-to-date car is equipped is charging when the engine is running. It must be definitely known that the current generated is neither more nor less than is required to keep the battery properly charged.

The amount of electrical current developed by a properly functioning generator is practically constant, while the amount consumed by the use of the various instruments which are supplied by the battery is never constant. It is evident, then, that a battery may be either over-charged or under-charged by a perfectly normal generator.—Erwin Greer, President Greer College of Automotive Engineering, Chicago.
