**GRANGE VOTES SUPPORT FOR PROHIBITION LAWS**

Enforcement of the Volstead act and other prohibition laws was urged by a strong resolution passed by the Multnomah District Pomona grange in its regular quarterly session at the Rockwood grange hall on November 4. It also condemns the Oregon Referendum League, organized to break down the law by arousing public sentiment against it, and to oppose it in every possible way. The resolutions, which were signed by R. W. Gill, J. J. Johnson and Mary E. Palmer, are as follows:

Whereas, there is a well organized movement within the state of Oregon having for its purpose the weakening if not the repeal of the "Volstead Act" and the return as far as possible to the days and the ways which existed prior to the enactment of said law—the said movement being specially sponsored by the Oregon Referendum League; and

Whereas, the Grange has been a strong advocate of and support to the prohibition movement, and we believe should now come out boldly against the purpose of such league and throw our whole influence, with other organizations working to uphold and to enforce to the limit the Volstead Act, therefore, be it

Resolved by Multnomah Pomona grange in regular session assembled, that we are of the opinion that the Volstead Act and all other prohibition laws should be rigidly and impartially enforced by national and state enforcement officers, and that all funds necessary for such enforcement should be furnished by states and nation. Be it further

Resolved that we feel that said "Oregon Referendum League" with its propaganda and secret workings against these laws is a public menace, and that its purpose and influence should be known and opposed publicly by all our members, and others of like opinion.

The meeting was well attended, about 150 being entertained at dinner by the Rockwood grange. The morning session was given over to the transaction of business matters. At the lecture hour in the afternoon an enjoyable program was given under the direction of the lecturer, Maude L. Landes. Fred Lockley of the Oregon Journal staff gave an address on "This Oregon of Ours," after which a discussion of the needs of the Oregon Normal was opened by W. A. Pettys, of the Peninsular school, who talked on the need of more money for the proper development of the school. Miss Arbuthnot of the Normal demonstrated modern teaching methods with a group of pupils from Russellville school. O. L. Martin, national lecturer, gave an interesting talk on grange work. The evening session followed another sumptuous meal furnished by Rockwood grange. The fifth degree was conferred upon a large class and a program of music and readings was given, followed by dancing.

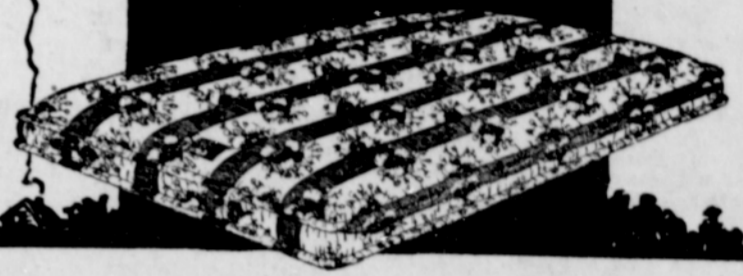
