It is announced that the schools will be closed, but a game will be played between the football teams of Gresham and Molalla high schools in the afternoon at Molalla. The Outlook office will also follow the general custom.

Postoffice service, however, will be the same as usual tomorrow. The mails will be received and dispatched and the carriers will take their routes without regard for the holiday.
