The present series of special meetings in the Methodist church, with Miss Caffray as evangelist, is a revival of the latter kind—spiritual, helpful and permanent.

The evangelist, of course, seeks to make results as definite and visible as possible but it is doubted if any can hear her message and appeal only once, even if the hearer go away with no demonstration, and not feel moved to a better understanding and a better life.

The attendance has been good but ought to be better. The season for the special effort is timely and only indifference or fear can account for the conspicuous absence of many good citizens who ought to get the renewing of mind and heart in the things that are highest and best in life.

Aside from a personal benefit, which, if received, is cause for devout thanksgiving, all good citizens may gladly welcome the benefit of a special effort to build up religious thought and life such as the present.

All must recognize the Christian church as the greatest influence making for righteousness in the land today. The greater its activity within all reasonable limits the greater its effectiveness.

In view of this, which no one will deny, there can not only be no reasonable objection to revival meetings, so-called, but all should give them hearty support, especially where the auspices are known and favorably recognized.

If it is indifference that keeps any friend of the church away from attendance on the special effort it does not speak well for the individuals' understanding or appreciation of the church as a moral and spiritual force in the community.

This week will end the second week of the meetings and Sunday may be the close of the special services. For any person to be able to say when they have closed that "they didn't get me," or "I didn't go once," will not be special cause for congratulation.

Mr. Tooze has had extensive educational training and successful experience in school teaching and administration, including the following: Common schools of Michigan; graduated from Michigan State Normal College; Bachelor Pedagogy, 6-year course; Michigan University, B. A. and advanced work in educational history, philosophy and administration.

He has taught in rural schools several years; has been teacher and principal of village schools four years; superintendent of city schools, including nine years in Oregon City, 14 years; educational work in Y. M. C. A. and teacher-training in Portland public schools, two years has been county instructor and member of committee on Education in sessions of the 1923 and 1925 legislatures, and chairman of the Senate Ways and Means committee during the last session.

At present he is editor and manager of the Oregon Teachers Monthly, Oregon's educational magazine; edits the Pacific Homestead, one of the leading periodicals of the Northwest and finds time to contribute regularly editorials on educational, civic and political matters to the Oregon Statesman, one of the state's leading dailies.

Notice of School Meeting

Notice is hereby given to the legal voters of School District No. Four of Multnomah County, State of Oregon, that a School Meeting of said district will be held at the Schoolhouse, on the 24th day of November, 1925, at 2:15 o'clock in the afternoon for the purpose of discussing the budget hereinafter set out with the levying board, and to vote on the proposition of levying a special district tax.

The total amount of money needed by the said school district during the fiscal year beginning on June 15, 1925, and ending June 30, 1926, is estimated in the following budget and includes the amounts to be received from the county school fund, state school fund, elementary school fund, special district tax, and all other moneys of the district:

BUDGET ESTIMATED EXPENDITURES table with columns for Personal Services, Material and Supplies, Maintenance and Repairs, Indebtedness, Transportation of Pupils, Insurance, Miscellaneous, and Total.

ESTIMATED RECEIPTS. From county school fund during the coming school year, \$4,968.56. From state school fund during the coming school year, \$364. From elementary school fund during the coming school year, \$6,964.2.

ESTIMATED RECEIPTS. Total estimated receipts not including proposed tax, \$12,501.32. Total estimated expenses for the year, \$37,460.00. Balance, amount to be raised by district tax, \$24,958.68.

Notice of School Election to Increase Tax More Than Six Per Cent Over That of the Previous Year. Notice is hereby given to the legal voters of School District No. Four of Multnomah County, State of Oregon, that an election will be held in said District at the Schoolhouse on the 24th day of November, 1925, at 2:15 o'clock in the afternoon, to vote on the question of increasing the amount of the tax levied in said District for the year 1925-26 by more than six per cent over the amount of such levy for the year immediately preceding.

It is necessary to raise this additional amount by special levy for the following reasons: Additional teachers, additional desks, etc., for new rooms. Low estimate on 1924 budget for finishing class rooms, laboratories and heating. Payment of bonds falling due March 1, 1926, and March 1, 1927, together with interest thereon.
