

## COUNCIL SEEKS NEW WATER CONNECTION

A new water connection with the Bull Run pipe line is being sought by the city council of Gresham, near the proposed water reservoir on the hill in the western part of the city. To that end a committee, consisting of Mayor Cleveland, T. R. Howitt and Russell Akin, was named at the adjourned meeting of the council on Wednesday evening to wait on the Portland city council to secure consent to the change by that body, if possible. The connection between the water system of Gresham and the Bull Run pipe line at present is at the street corner near the city hall, where the master meter is located. The proposed change would obviate the running of a main from the present connection to the reservoir, which will be near the pipe line. The location has not been definitely decided upon but the choice will be between two proposed sites, one east and one west of Wallula avenue. A report on the location was expected at the last council meeting but the committee was not ready to report.

Much good work is being done on the graveled streets of the city to put them in shape for the winter. Holes are being filled and gravel is being spread over places that have become furrowed or thin by months of travel. Marshal E. H. Kelly is doing the work under the direction of the committee on streets of the city council.

A splinter of a steel wedge, about a half inch in length, flew and imbedded itself in the fleshy portion of the leg. It was removed with considerable difficulty, as it had gone through to the bone. Both boys are doing well and will probably be none the worse for the occurrences.

## AMERICAN LEGION WILL HOLD REGULAR MEETING TUESDAY

## GRESHAM STREETS MAY BE NOTED EDUCATOR TO TRIMMED FOR CHRISTMAS

There is a plan on foot, which, if carried out, will lend an air of Christmas festivity to the business section of Gresham and at the same time possibly be the means of assisting in stimulating the holiday business. The details of this plan as worked out by S. Tajima, the window washer, consist of stringing a festoon of green boughs along the curb, probably from seven to nine feet in height, supported by red posts, the two colors to combine into a pleasing color scheme, the "official" colors of the Christmas season.

The cost of such an enterprise would be very conservative, according to the figures of Tajima, and would entail no hardship on any one particular firm, probably \$150 covering the cost of the decorations of the business part of Main and Powell streets, and \$100 for the labor connected with it. Plans are to be worked out if the consensus of opinion of the business men would seem to warrant the carrying out of the decorative scheme.

Permission will be asked of the city council at the next meeting for the approval of the plans to decorate the streets for the Christmas season. While it is not thought there will be any objection to the proposed decoration, the matter will be laid before the body for its consideration.

## GRESHAMITE LOSES IN DAY ROBBERY

Petty thieves apparently had a grudge against Gresham last Saturday, as, in addition to the theft of about \$60 in cash from the Twentieth Century grocery and the pilfering of four brooded chickens from the Gantenbein home on Wallula Heights, another robbery has come to light in which Roy Crabtree has sustained a loss of at least \$150 in a daylight raid on his clothes closet, the plunderer making way with his two best suits of clothes, a raincoat and a genuine leather traveling bag.

Crabtree occupies a sleeping room over the furniture store of J. E. Metzger where he is employed as an undertaker in that part of the establishment. During the progress Saturday forenoon of the Adventist religious services in the rooms over the store and which are across the hall from Mr. Crabtree's sleeping quarters, a man was heard to ascend the stairs. Something was thought of it as it was about time for the religious service to be dismissed, but no investigation was made on the supposition it was a belated attendant at the meeting. However, since that time, it is conjectured that possibly this was the person who entered the sleeping room and appropriated the clothing. Other small clues have been traced down, but so far nothing of any importance has resulted to throw light on the daring robbery.

The initials of the owner were engraved on the traveling bag which was much treasured as a gift from a friend. These were on a tab, however, and could easily be detached from the bag. An expensive cloth overcoat was left lying on a nearby chair where it had evidently been discarded as too heavy to be crammed into the satchel.

## MOTORMAN SEVERELY BURNED BY CURRENT

To the fact that he wore rubber shoes, Steve Webber, of Milwaukie, Oregon, a motorman employed on the freight train of the Portland Electric Power company that passes through Gresham each day, probably owes his life, when his hands were badly burned Friday forenoon at Bull Run as the result of a short circuit which occurred when the motorman opened a switchbox of the motor. The injured man was brought to the office of Dr. Hughes where his hands were dressed and from here he was taken to Sellwood for further treatment, before being removed to his home.

The flash came so unexpectedly it can hardly be accurately described just how the mishap occurred. Webber stood on the pump of the motor to open the heater switch to turn off the heat when there was an instantaneous flash. If the employe had been shod with the ordinary leather shoes, there is no doubt but that he would have been instantly electrocuted. As it was, his hands were severely burned and a hole was burned in the steel roof of the car.

Mr. Webber was a former resident of Gresham.
