Woman Brings Damage Suit.

A case which is now being tried in the circuit court before Judge Morrow is that in which Mrs. Hannah Unis, owner of a ten-acre tract in the western part of the Powell Valley district near Gustavus station, is bringing suit against Multnomah county for the payment of \$1200 as price for the right of way of the Mt. Hood Loop highway thoroughfare ranging south past Ed Simonson's and the Williams property. The plaintiff, Mrs. Unis, alleges that she had previously been offered \$800 for the right of way, but as the proposed road will cut off the only suitable building site she has, she has concluded that the price of \$800 was inadequate.

Four appraisers have been subpoenaed by the plaintiff, who is represented by a former Gresham attorney, Milo C. King. John Brown is one of the witnesses and is testifying as to land values of property in and around the disputed area, which comprises nearly an acre of ground. Other appraisers are Edwin Anderson, August Frank and Mrs. Louis Berg.
