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Typhoid Fever.

What is the cause of typhoid fever? It is caused by a tiny germ, the bacillus typhosus, which gets into the body of the sick person. It enters by way of the mouth and is eliminated with the discharges of the body.

How do persons contract typhoid fever? Principally by swallowing germs that have come from some case of typhoid fever.

What are the main agencies by which the bacillus is spread? By contaminated food, water and milk; by flies and carriers.

How long does it take typhoid fever to develop? It varies from seven to fourteen days.

What are the first symptoms? Headache, nosebleed, bronchitis, relatively slow pulse, deafness, eruption and continued fever.

What is a typhoid carrier? A well person harboring the germ of typhoid fever. He is a menace to the community, especially if he comes in contact with food or milk supplies.

How can we detect carriers? By laboratory examination of feces and urine.

What should be done with the carrier?

He should be isolated until he is no longer a danger.

Is typhoid fever preventable? Entirely so. Proper sanitary measures will protect the community and immunization will protect the individual.

What is the most important preventive measure? Disinfection of the discharges of the infected person, thus stopping the infection at its source.

Is there any method of protection against typhoid fever as for smallpox and diphtheria? Yes, anti-typhoid immunization.

How often should one be immunized? Every three years.

What are the restrictions placed on typhoid fever cases in Oregon? They must be reported to the health department. Patient must be isolated until the discharges are free from typhoid germs. Food products cannot be sold by a typhoid convalescent or by a healthy carrier.
