HAIL TO PROGRESS!

The Outlook congratulates the Oregonian on its diamond jubilee and on the fine jubilee issue and "open house" in celebration of its 75th anniversary.

Through a pioneer the Oregonian is not ancient, though 75 years old it is not senile but young in spirit and broad in influence.

December 4 is the Oregonian's significant date. The newspaper was established December 4, 1850, as a weekly.

Quite recently the Weekly Oregonian was discontinued. During the past decade some of the earliest composers, editors and associates have passed to their eternal reward.

These new and expensive methods of production and speed in distribution have given the city dailies a prestige that has caused the ordinary country weekly to struggle for existence—and sometimes fail.

The Outlook, some 15 years ago, sensed this trend and has given the people of this favored locality a twice-a-week newspaper, small, it is true, as compared with the big city daily, but holding its own against this strong competition and growing with the community and at the same time cooperating to the fullest extent with its big metropolitan competitors.

Probably scarcely one out of a hundred of the readers of the Oregonian has even a faint idea of the extent of the organization, management, machinery and material back of and employed in the production of such a newspaper. It would be a revelation to see it in the making.

Whether the newspaper makes the city or the city makes the newspaper is a subject for debate. It seems certain the one could not come about in the modern sense without the other.
