

PORTLAND SYMPHONY TO GIVE CONCERT DEC. 14

The third concert of the season of the Portland Symphony orchestra, William van Hoogstraten, conductor, is scheduled for December 14. Josef Lhevinne, eminent Russian piano virtuoso, will be the soloist.

The concert on the 14th will be in some respects the most interesting and unique of the season's offerings. Mr. van Hoogstraten is continuing his policy of presenting more or less unfamiliar works on the same programs with thoroughly standard compositions. Two large donations were made to the symphony society following the first concert, for the purpose of providing unique music for the orchestra. With these funds, Mr. van Hoogstraten has purchased the tone poem of Richard Strauss, "Don Juan," also the fourth symphony of Johann Brahms, which is scheduled for presentation at the next concert. Mr. Lhevinne will play the fourth piano concerto of Anton Gregorovitch Rubinstein with the orchestra.

Mr. van Hoogstraten's policies pertaining to encores and hour of performance will be enforced as at the last concert.

At that time many people were unable to secure seats. The management has announced that many seats are not yet taken by season subscribers, and urges that people who were disappointed before place their orders for reservations at once.
