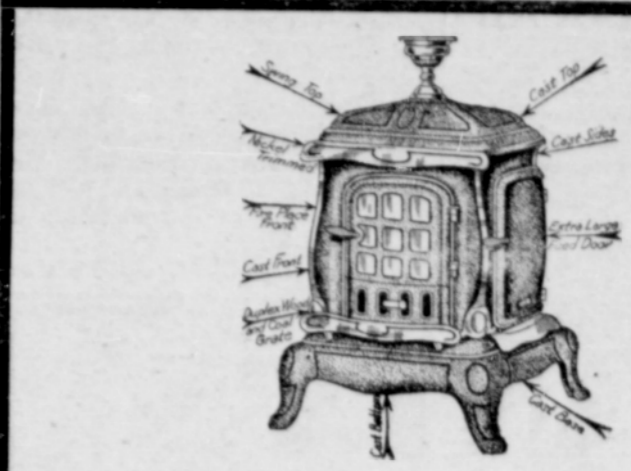
DAMASCUS
