**YULETIDE TREE REMOVED FROM GRESHAM STREETS**

Gresham's community Christmas tree has been dismantled, the last of the work being completed Wednesday and the tree itself hauled away probably to end its career in a fireplace or heater. The first attempt of Gresham to successfully launch the project of a community tree was crowned with success and many pleasing comments were made on the beauty and symmetry of the tree, the arrangements of its lighting system and the general effect it had on the Yuletide spirit and festivities.

Really, more commendable than any other phase of the situation was the fact that at the busiest season of the year so many business men gave freely of their time, energy and means to make possible the pleasing spectacle that graced the intersection of Main and Powell streets from the 12th of December until the first week in January.

Visitors passing through Gresham while the tree was brilliantly lighted were lavish in their praise of this particular tree as regards size and beauty of natural arrangement. Robert Hayes, who came from Seattle to spend Christmas with relatives here, said the Gresham tree far eclipsed any he saw on the road down, although nearly every town he passed through had its Christmas tree. Equally flattering remarks were heard from others who came to Gresham from a distance for the holiday season.

The committee in charge of the arrangements reports that there were plenty of funds in the treasury to meet the expenses of lighting, decorations, etc., and that probably there will be a small reserve when all bills are met. Five hundred bags of Christmas treats were prepared for children and were given out at the exercises held in the Gresham grade school on the evening of December 22. No child under ten years of age was disappointed and many others older than the age limit were participants in this distribution.

The only regrettable thing about the whole affair was the way the weather misbehaved on the evening the program was rendered. The grade school auditorium proved entirely inadequate to the crowd. The house was simply "packed" and many left who were unable to gain entrance. People came as far distant as Kelso, this side of Sandy, and in spite of the inclement weather, many other equally distant points were represented.

The tree was lowered Tuesday with the same care that was exercised when it was raised. The top was cut off above the guy wires and let to the ground, after which the tree was brought to its side by means of wires and ropes.

**FORMER GRESHAM WOMAN DIES FROM PARALYSIS**

Mrs. Vesta Elizabeth Raney died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Walter Dean, near Stanley station, January 3. She suffered a stroke about five years ago from which she never entirely recovered and for the past two and a half years had been confined to her bed much of the time, suffering successive strokes.

Mrs. Raney was born October 22, 1847, at Fayetteville, Arkansas, and crossed the plains with her parents at the age of 13, settling near the present town of Estacada. She was married to Samuel H. Raney in 1867 who preceded her in death over 17 years ago. To this union eight children were born, all of whom survive her. They are Charles H., of Gresham, Benjamin M., Harley S. and George, of Portland, William B., of Hood River, Mrs. Bird Beaman, of Manning, North Dakota, Mrs. Lina Guthridge, of Springfield and Mrs. Lena Dean, of Stanley station. The children were all at the bedside of their mother the day of her death, except the daughter in North Dakota and the son in Hood River. Mrs. Raney lived in Gresham a number of years, building the house on Third street near Roberts avenue occupied by Mrs. Annie Wright, which is still the property of the Raney estate.

Funeral services were held at the Springwater church near Estacada, the Rev. Mr. Weins officiating, with interment in the Springwater cemetery under the direction of the Gates Funeral home of Gresham.
