UP-TO-DATE STAGE NOW ON BASE LINE RUN

Much admiration has been expressed on all sides during the past week for the handsome new Garford bus which was put on the Base Line run of the Portland-Gresham stage service New Year's day. Upholstered in a beautiful shade of blue plush velour, the big gray car, with comfortable chair seats finished in wicker, presents an inviting appearance and has been the source of many complimentary remarks.

E. H. Lewis, proprietor of both the Powell Valley and Base Line stage routes, purchased the chassis of the machine in Portland to be delivered in San Francisco, the body being made to order in the latter city. It is equipped with a six-cylinder Budda motor and has the latest improvements and devices making up a modern interurban motor bus, up-to-date in every particular and well adapted for the purpose. The estimated cost of the car, complete, is said to be around \$10,000. The seating capacity is 28 passengers with an emergency capacity of 32.

Tom Cooper drove the machine up from San Francisco at the time of its purchase and has been employed by Mr. Lewis as the permanent driver on the line between Gresham and Portland.




