### CHIROPRACTOR MOVES TO LARGER QUARTERS

Dr. Mary Becker yesterday moved her office and chiropractic examination and treatment rooms from her residence on Main street to the new quarters in the north side of the Sell building at Main and Second street which have been undergoing removation and remodeling for the past month to meet her requirements. A remarkable transformation has been effected in the former dingy building. The color scheme throughout is a cheerful buff with trimmings of ivory, lending to the paneled interior a particularly light and sunny aspect. The floors of the reception room and private office are covered with a brick tile linoleum and the floors of the remaining eight rooms and hall are also treated to a linoleum floor covering. Cretonne hangings are in keeping with the general decorations and add much to the attractiveness of the rooms.

There are two main operating rooms one containing the high-frequency electric machine and the other the therapeutic sunlight room, each designed for a special line of treatment. Two bath rooms in which are given the electric sweat bath and the electric mineral bath are important parts of the chiropractic facilities. In addition there are dressing rooms and rest rooms, with private office and re-7 ception room near the front entrance.

Dr. Becker states she has literally outgrown her offices in her residence. With a constantly increasing practice the rooms for treatment at her home were becoming more and more inadequate. She came to Gresham about four years ago from Portland. She is a graduate of the Pacific Chiropractic College in that city and prior to taking up work there, had studied in Iowa and also in Battle Creek, Michigan. At the latter place she had been a pupil of Bernar McFadden, founder of the well-known magazine, "Physical Culture." Dr. Becker was the first nurse to be employed by Dr. McFadden in Battle Creek.
