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WHY ANTI-PROHIBITION ACTIVITY?

The springing up of organized bodies all over the country with the avowed purpose of modifying the Volstead act or repealing the 18th amendment to the constitution, leads one to inquire into the reason for all this activity.

The proponents of the new organizations tell us that it is because the law is unenforceable, and for that reason should be repealed.

By the same token the laws against murder and theft and speeding and any number of laws should be repealed. Crimes are being committed every day by the lawless, yet we do not find any move to repeal the laws governing society, and to remove the penalty for these crimes.

Laws are never perfectly enforced, and on this account steps are taken to protect society from those who would disregard them. When burglars and bank robbers and speed maniacs become active we increase our police forces, but when the prohibition law is violated those who are trying to break it down cry out, "It cannot be enforced. Modify or repeal it."

Apparently the one real point made by H. H. Stallard in his harangue in Gresham the other night was when he said that the prohibition enforcement officers should be friends of the law, not its enemies. He was heartily applauded on that point. Just what bearing the statement has, however, on his subject, was hard to understand. From the secretary of the treasury down to the constable or town marshal, those in office should be law abiding, and have regard for their oaths of office.

Modification of the Volstead act to permit light wines and beer would not correct the evil. The liquor traffic was never known to tolerate regulation. The safest and best way is to eradicate the traffic, which can be reduced to a minimum when the people will put into office those who stand for enforcement of all laws after election as well as before, and who make an honest effort to do the things for which they were elected.

In speaking of the pleas for light wine and beer Bishop Walter T. Sumner of the Episcopal diocese of Oregon recently said:

"After having lived and worked for ten years during the wet days in the vice district of Chicago, and as a member of the first municipal vice commission of Chicago, I know that the drunkenness on every hand was due to beer drinking.

"The proposed modification of the Volstead law simply is a desire to secure intoxicants. Anybody that denies this is either ignorant or is interested in seeing intoxicants returned.

"From excellent sources and from observation I am convinced that the gains of society economically, socially, industrially and morally are tremendous in these days, over the wet days, and while there is a deplorable disregard of law enforcement in certain localities and by certain classes, the law is here, it can be enforced and it will be enforced more and more as time goes on."

An Indian Uprising.

Seymour, state club leader, related a humorous incident in connection with his visit to the Warm Springs Indian agency on the reservation which is located in Wasco county in central Oregon on the Des Chutes river. Mr. Seymour was making an effort to explain the benefits to be derived from club work among the Indians and to that end had taken along a moving picture film to illustrate the various phases of the work and was making his talk as effective as possible aided by the reels of movies.

Now as every one knows, an Indian is stoical to the nth degree. He simply hasn't any emotion or response in him to speak of, and Mr. Seymour might have been talking to the pine trees in the forest so far as the several hundred Indians gathered for the occasion gave any sign of understanding or approval. All at once there was an upheaval. In other words there was an Indian uprising as the Indians rose en masse and cheered the picture of a boy well known to Gresham residents and a boy who has been prominent in club work for several years.

Their stoicism had suddenly come to an end as a picture of Lawrence Alys-worth posing with a calf was flashed onto the screen before their astonished eyes. The picture was one which had been taken at the summer school at Corvallis and showed Lawrence in a frankish mood playing with a calf a week old. He was trying to make the calf pose for a picture and had placed two of his fingers in the animal's mouth, forming a comical situation which was eagerly snapped by a camera man.

The indifference of the Indians had now vanished as if by magic and they were all attention during the rest of the lecture and entered into the spirit of the meeting which had been arranged for their benefit.
