LAMB CALLED FAVORITE AND HEALTHFUL MEAT

Owing to a seasonal increase in lamb recipes at livestock markets, the wholesale price of lamb has declined appreciably since the first of February and this meat, especially cuts from the shoulder and breast, should offer the consumer a relatively economical buy, according to an announcement recently issued by the Colorado Stockgrowers association.

"Lamb has been found to be one of the most healthful, nutritious, and tasty of all meats. In England, it is one of the most popular meats. The per capita consumption of lamb in England is about five times greater than it is here," the announcement states.

"There are many ways to prepare lamb cuts. The shoulder may be sliced and served in the form of chops or it may be roasted. The breast may be boned and rolled for roasting or it may be served in the form of a stew. The leg, loin, and ribs also are roasted or served as chops or steaks.

A few recipes for preparing economical and delicious lamb dishes follow: Leg of Lamb Roast—Select a leg of lamb weighing at least 7 or 8 pounds. Rub salt and pepper over the surface of the meat. Place the meat on a rack in a large roasting pan and dredge with flour. Bake in a hot oven until the surface is seared (525 degrees), then reduce the heat (450 degrees). Baste often, unless a covered roaster is used. Roast about 30 minutes per pound. Serve on a platter. Prepare gravy from the juice in the pan and flavor it with mint.

Shoulder Chops of Lamb en Casserole—Trim and remove the extra fat from six lamb chops cut from the shoulder. Brown them on both sides in butter or dripping fat. Season with salt and pepper, and add half cup of water. Cover tightly and let stand over a low flame for one hour or until the chops are tender, or place the chops in a casserole and bake in the oven for one and one-half to two hours. Remove the meat from the dish. Make gravy, using two tablespoons flour and extra stock if necessary. Place the chops on a platter and pour gravy over them.

Stuffed Shoulder of Lamb Roasted—Select a shoulder weighing about four or five pounds. Remove the shoulder blade, but leave three or four inches of the shank bone. Remove any skin or fat on the outside and wipe the meat. Lay the shoulder open, sprinkle the surface with salt and pepper, and spread with stuffing. Fold or roll the meat over, and tie or skewer it into shape. Lay it on a rack in the roasting pan and place it in a hot oven (500 degrees). Allow to sear or brown for 30 minutes. Add one cup hot water. Continue to roast, basting frequently. Either a covered or uncovered roasting pan may be used. Allow about 20 to 25 minutes to each pound of meat (at temperature of 400 to 450 degrees). When more seasoning is desired, place in the pan carrot, onion, and a piece of celery chopped fine, a dozen peppers, a bit of bay leaf, and a sprig of parsley. Serve with gravy made from fat from the pan and a tart of jelly.

A stuffed shoulder may be skewered into shape and garnished to look like a mock duck. Stuffing—Two cups of bread crumbs, 1/4 cup stock or water, 1 tablespoon butter, 1 egg, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 1/2 teaspoon chopped parsley, 1 slice onion, chopped. Add 1 dozen oysters if desired.

Browned Lamb Stew with Dumplings—Select 2 or 3 pounds of lamb from the shoulder or breast. Wipe and cut the meat into suitable pieces for serving. Sear the pieces in hot fat in an iron kettle. Add 2 cups of hot water, salt, pepper, and 1 tablespoon of chopped celery tops or parsley, and cook for 1 hour. Then add 1 cup of diced potatoes, 1/2 cup of cubed carrots, 1 sliced onion, and 1/4 cup diced celery. Continue cooking for 1 hour or until the meat is tender. Just before the meat is done, drop the dumplings into the kettle cover, and do not disturb for 20 minutes. Serve in a large meat dish or deep platter, arranging the dumplings around the meat.

Irish Stew—Use 1 1/2 pounds of neck of lamb, 2 carrots, 2 onions, 1 turnip (small), 2 or 3 medium potatoes, water or stock, and flour.

Cut the meat into small pieces and place it in a deep frying pan or kettle. Cover with cold water and bring the kettle to a boil. Add cubed carrots and a sliced onion. Lower the heat and simmer the meat for about two hours. Then add cubed potatoes and

cook more rapidly until the potatoes are done. Thicken the liquid with flour and serve.

Son prefer to roll the meat in flour and brown it in hot fat before adding the water or stock. If this method is used, the onions may be browned in the fat before adding the meat to brown.

Are You Up on Flying Slang?

The other day a friend of mine came into the school with Major "Meet the Flying Fool" he introduced. All of which leads up to the picturesque air argot and trade jargon of the men who fly. It is a language all its own.

Naval flyers are "Mud Hens" so called because invariably in a forced landing they drop into marshes or swamps along the ocean edge. A recruit is a Flying K.P.

And actually he is peeling potatoes even though he is in the air service. Adjustments and overhauls of motors are called "Manicures." A "sandbag" is a passenger. A short flight is a "hop." "Night flying" is shop talk. Those who participate are called "barack bombers."

A "porpoise" is a poor landing. Shop talk is taboo at social gatherings and the command to cease such conversation is expressed by "Put that ship in the hangar."

"Tail spin" is the idiom for being embarrassed. Thus a pretty flapper may have flustered a flier so that another pilot will say: "Knocked him into a tail spin." Faux pas is "a skid." An argument starts this way: "I'll knock you for a row of tin hangars."
