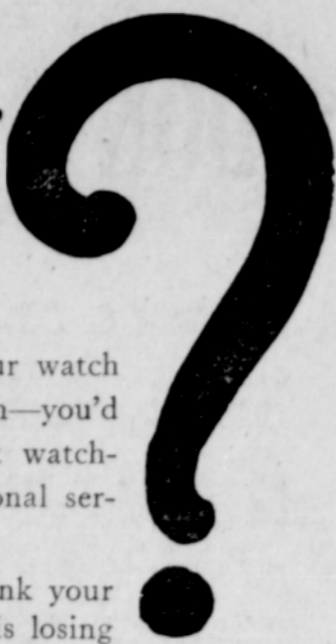

During the recent terrific storms on the Atlantic four ships almost simultaneously reported themselves in peril.

"Fifty years ago," says the Paris, France, Times, "not only would they have been unable to call for help, but they would have stood strong chances of going down with all hands. Even in the steamer lanes, a sinking craft blown off her course or just cut off the range of visibility of passing ships would have stood small chance of rescue. However, when the faint three dots, three dashes and three dots of the distress signal were picked up by some watchful wireless operator, the word was passed and the air was cleared for reception of the unfortunate ship's position and the organization of relief."

"The signals of the powerful navy stations crashed through the atmosphere, demanding right of way and silencing broadcasting. The music and entertainment going out from scores of American stations was stopped for the longest period since the popularization of the radio. Millions of listeners-in on two continents were informed that ships were in distress and that they would have to forego their evening's entertainment."

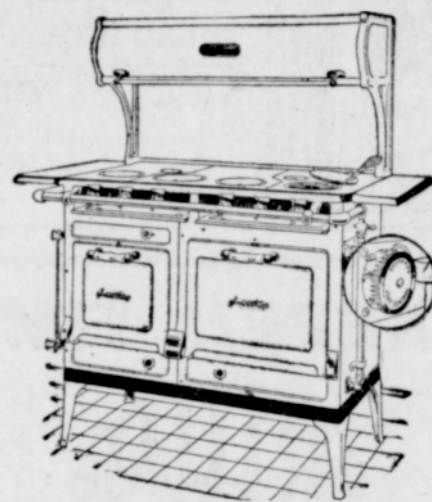
