The Arme club will meet Friday evening for a 500 card party at the home of Dr. and Mrs. H. V. Adix.

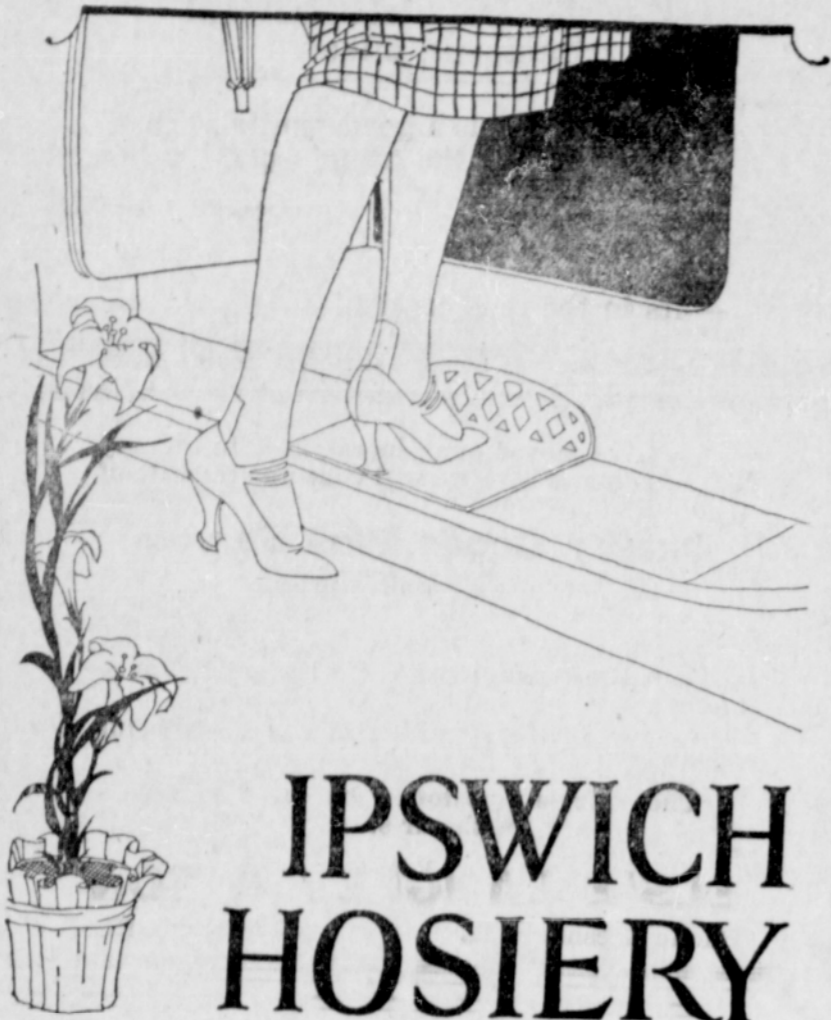
