Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Dahlquist are rejoicing over the arrival of a fine baby girl at their home. The little miss arrived on the 16th.

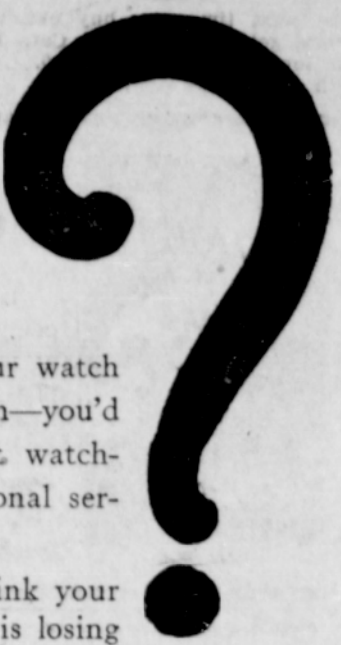
Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Turner of Tillamook were recent visitors at the home of Mr. Turner's brother, B. E. Turner, of this place.
