FORMER PASTOR HERE HAS SUCCESSFUL WORK

In a letter just received from the Rev. Erwin G. Ranton, former pastor of the Methodist Episcopal church at Pleasant Home, he gives a detailed account of a religious revival held on the Nehalem-Wheeler charge. The meetings were conducted by the pastor, assisted by his brother, Evangelist H. J. Ranton, the latter doing the preaching. The preaching for the first week or ten days was directed to the members of the church and the response was most gratifying. The letter states that things that looked almost impossible have been accomplished and that people of outstanding influence in the community were among the recruits of the church.

The influence of the meetings was felt for miles away, people coming as far as ten miles distant to hear the messages. About 30 went from Nehalem to Garibaldi two nights to assist as they might in services. Besides a large number of Sunday school children there were about 30 professed conversions and 13 additions to the church.

The evangelist is now conducting a campaign at Pratum, Oregon, near Salem. The writer of the letter said they were enjoying themselves on the Nehalem charge as they had on the Powell Valley circuit.
