CONTRACTS ARE LET ON FAIR BUILDING

The contract for the building of the main fair pavilion to be erected this summer was let last night to D. T. Eaton of Portland, who submitted the lowest of a large number of bids. His bid was \$12,475 for tile, or \$12,275 for concrete construction. Decision has not been reached as to which will be used. J. F. Shea won the bid for the plumbing, his figure being \$2438.

The building will be one story in height and will cover an area of 70 by 140 feet. The walls will be finished in stucco. Luscius & Cash of Portland were the architects.

TROUTDALE MAN DIES AFTER BRIEF ILLNESS

Noah Sherman Long, a resident of Troutdale for the past six years, died at the family home Saturday, April 17, at the age of 62 years. He had been ailing for several years, but had been bedfast only about three weeks. The direct cause of his death was organic heart trouble.

The deceased was born in Illinois and came with his family from Camas, Washington, to Troutdale about six years ago where they had since run a confectionery. He was a man well liked in the neighborhood and was an especial favorite of children and young people by whom he will be greatly missed. He also leaves a sister, Mrs. Hound, of Battle Ground, Washington, and two brothers, Iias Long, of Bridal Veil, and Dr. C. S. Long, of Portland.
