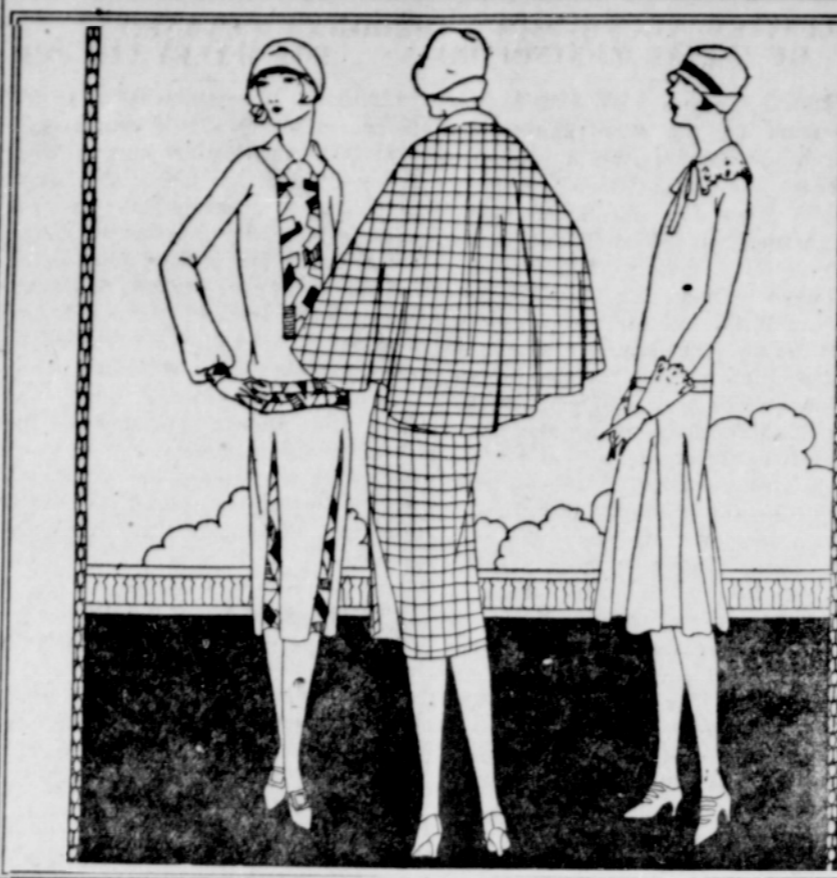
J. A. Bushong and family visited Sunday with Mrs. Bushong's sister, Mrs. H. A. Sherman and family at Warren, Oregon.
