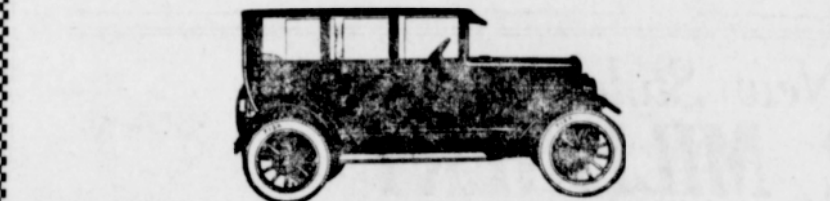

Stanfield Keeps Promise to World War Veterans

He voted to over-ride the President's veto of the Adjusted Compensation Act, May 19, 1924; also the veto of the joint Civil War and Spanish-American War veterans' pension-increase bill in 1924. He actively supported the Spanish-American veterans' pension-increase bill which passed the Senate April 14, 1926, and was signed by the President May 1.

Has a Record of 100 Per Cent for Labor
Senator Stanfield has a record of 100 per cent for legislation beneficial to Labor and Women's and Children's Welfare. He says: "I believe that labor is entitled to bargain collectively and to a greater share of the profits of industry."
States which re-elect their Senators and Representatives have a far greater influence in governmental affairs and obtain much larger appropriations and other Federal aid than those states which send new men to Congress.
