**ANTI-SALOON TICKET
INCLUDES STEIWER**

The Anti-Saloon of Oregon approves of the candidacy of Frederick Steiwer for United States senator, Patterson for the republican nomination and Pierce for the democratic nomination for governor, according to its list of recommendations just given to the press of the state. B. F. Mulkey has received its approval for congressional candidate from the third district. Where all candidates are satisfactory or where the dry cause is not endangered, no recommendations made. The candidates approved by the league for the judgeships are Howell for circuit judge department No. 4, and Stapleton for circuit judge department No. 8. Bennett is recommended for state senator and Dunne for joint senator.

The league recommends 16 candidates among the 46 republicans for the house of representatives, with 13 to vote for. Those endorsed are Walter G. Lynn, L. D. Mahone, J. B. McCourt, James D. Olson, F. R. Peterson, J. E. Anderson, J. O. Bailey, E. C. Bronaugh, Jr., E. W. Eastman, Bradley A. Ewers, Herbert Gordon, A. H. Johnson, Dorr E. Keasey, Addie S. Kimble, H. L. Langoe and Mrs. Dorothy McCullough Lee. The lone democrat recommended for representative is Frank Schlegel. Fred Meindl is endorsed for joint representative.

For county commissioner the league recommends Grant Phegley and Thomas H. Hurlburt (not the sheriff).

Walter W. Whitbeck, who resigned from the Crossley campaign committee a few days ago, sponsors the "wage earners" ticket. Whitbeck recommends Crossley for senator, Crumpacker for representative in congress, Upton for governor, Hawkins for circuit judge, department No. 4; Deich for court of domestic relations; Kerrigan for district court No. 1 and Hendrickson for district court No. 3. For state senator Bennett is indorsed and Dunne is indorsed for joint senator. The legislative representatives indorsed are: Jack N. Barde, Wilber Henderson, F. R. Peterson, J. S. Gay Jr., E. C. Bronaugh, Jr., Earle Wellington, A. G. Rushlight, L. D. Mahone, F. C. Ream, J. B. McCourt, James D. Olson, H. J. Langoe and F. W. German. For county commissioners, Paul E. Struck and Grant Phegley. The ticket is for increased pay for police and firemen and for the financial measures.

All Ex-Soldiers Backed.

The "red, white and blue" ticket sponsored by the Veterans' Political union, by G. L. Koehn, president, recommends all former soldiers; thus it recommends for United States senator Steiwer, Crossley, Sandblast and Clark. For representative in congress, Crumpacker; for governor, Upton; circuit judge, department No. 4, Hawkins; department No. 8, Ekwall; for senator, Klepper. The house ticket recommended consists of E. C. Bronaugh Jr., Allan A. Bynon, James H. Cassell, J. S. Gay Jr., D. D. Hall, Wilber Henderson, Barge E. Leonard, L. D. Ma-

He was born at Salem in 1884, and is a son of ex-Governor W. P. Lord. After attending the public schools Mr. Lord acquired his collegiate education at Willamette University and his legal education in the law department of that institution.

Upon his graduation from the law department he was appointed by the Supreme Court to assist in the compilation of the Oregon Code and which became known as Lord's Oregon Laws. Upon the completion of this work he embarked in the practice of law in Salem. In 1913 he moved to Portland where he has been engaged in the practice of his profession ever since.

In 1914 he organized the Lake Labish Drainage District which resulted in the reclamation of a large tract of valuable land in the Willamette valley. He is the owner of one of the largest onion farms in the state.

Mr. Lord is a member of the Chamber of Commerce and also of the American Bar Uniform State Law Commission.

In his platform he promises if elected to labor for the reduction of taxes and to support legislation having for its object the consolidation of state departments and commissions. He believes that fish and game should be eliminated from politics, and that the penitentiary should be placed on a sound basis. He is opposed to the so-called peddlers license law and favors a reduction in automobile licenses where possible. He favors harbor development and more industries and payrolls for Portland.
