Platform

I believe in the Direct Primary and am opposed to any oligarchy endeavoring to pick out and force candidate upon the members of the Republican party.

BUCHTEL CANDIDATE FOR COMMISSIONER

"Fred G. Buchtel, statistician, financial analyst." That's how his letter-head reads and it must be so. He's that type of man.

Passing a civil service examination, some years ago, Mr. Buchtel was appointed Portland's first city sealer, at which time he initiated and successfully carried out a campaign for the delivery of full weight and measure in the purchase and sale of foods, wood, coal and ice, the fruits of which campaign are of benefit yet today.

Because of the economical and efficient manner in which he had conducted the Portland office of weights and measures, State Treasurer Thos. B. Kay appointed him state sealer, in which capacity he drafted and secured the enactment of laws which eliminated inaccurate weighing and measuring apparatus in Oregon.

Mr. Buchtel was afterwards elected state public service commissioner and served in that position during the trying days of the war and reconstruction period.

Buchtel's Platform.

Mr. Buchtel advocates regular sessions of the board of county commissioners, open to the public, for the transaction of county business.

He favors a division of the administration into three departments, each headed by a commissioner, who should be held responsible for the efficient conduct of affairs.

He would have the county purchasing department operated so as to give to each and every interest a fair and even chance to secure the county business.

He would extend more protection to the outlying districts in road matters and try to provide laterals and arteries connecting with the main highways that the farmers and dairymen may have easy access to the business centers and to Portland.

He would make the service of the board more available to the people who pay the taxes.

Mr. Buchtel was born in Portland in 1878; is the son of Joseph Buchtel, Oregon pioneer; is a Mason, member of the Shrine, of Multnomah Camp Woodmen of the World, and other organizations; is a life long resident of the East Side, and thoroughly acquainted with civic and county affairs.

His slogan says: "If nominated and elected I will apply business principles to the people's business."

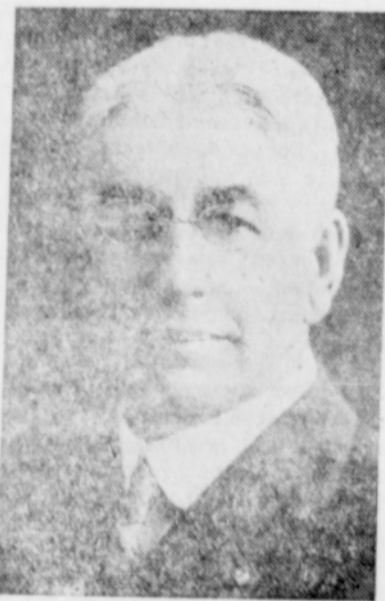

After the business meeting a fine program was rendered consisting of a song by four girls entitled, "I've a pain in my sawdust"; a song, "Come let us make a garden", by the primary grades; an Indian club drill by the upper grade boys and girls; a song, "I've got the mumps", by five boys; a harmonica number by Edw. Strong of Gresham, and a talk by Dr. Richenstein, of the dental clinic, on teeth hygiene. Flowers were presented by Mrs. R. C. Brooks to the retiring officers. Ice cream and wafers were served during the evening.
