CRUMPACKER'S OPPOSITION SPLIT.

Maurice E. Crumpacker, of the third congressional district of Oregon, is the only Oregon congressman to have opposition in the primary election for nomination.

He is opposed by former state senator B. F. Mulkey, who is able, progressive and an old hand in politics.

Mr. Mulkey on the other hand is making a strong bid for the prohibition vote. The net result will be the radical wet vote will go to Richards and the radical dry vote will be cast for Mulkey while the great body of voters, not as yet aroused on this issue, will go to the congressman from Multnomah, assuring him the nomination.

This will be the case excepting Mulkey's ability as a campaigner and his astuteness as a politician does not upset the even tenor of the campaign to date or the wet vote unexpectedly turns out in great numbers on election day.

From a party standpoint there is no occasion in the minds of party leaders in Portland for a change of congressman from Mr. Crumpacker's district. He is a good administration man, fairly reflects the various interests of his district, has made good progress in influence in party councils in Washington, and so why change, they argue.

All in all Crumpacker is sitting pretty and will be nominated.—Smith's Analyst.

POLK COUNTY FOR PATTERSON.

SCHOOL MEASURE NOT RECOMMENDED

tricts get what little is left. And out of this remainder the salary and expenses of the office are paid. What is left goes to the districts. This, of course will leave a deficiency which will be made up, if at all, by special levy in the various districts.

It has been rather closely estimated that this deficiency will require a levy of about three-tenths of a mill on the assessed valuation outside of Portland.

The most apparent animus back of the effort to adopt this bill at this time is to get rid of Alderson. Alderson has been elected by Portland's vote.

The committee backing the bill and most outspoken against Alderson says that Alderson was defeated 1297 to 483 in the districts outside of Portland and was elected by Portland.

Ray W. Gill is quoted as saying, "I believe the general dissatisfaction over Alderson's administration in the rural districts was the incentive for getting this bill passed. However, Alderson is only an incident in this affair and ratification of house bill 460 will correct a situation that is intolerable to the rural districts of Multnomah county."

"Even though we must assume making the cost of the office we prefer to elect our own superintendent and feel that such an official so elected will be more alive to his duties when he realizes he must face the voters interested in the office of county school superintendent."

The situation is rather peculiar. Alderson is a candidate for state superintendent of public instruction, for which there are five candidates on the republican ticket and two on the democratic ticket. Alderson, though he may not be the most efficient, is the most outstanding and will undoubtedly get the Portland vote and is likely to be nominated. If so, and he is elected next fall, we will still have Alderson in a larger though perhaps not so direct a capacity. If he is not elected he will continue as county school superintendent for the balance of his term, two or more years.

If Alderson is nominated and elected in the state capacity it is very certain who will be most likely to succeed him in the county and he will be a most acceptable county school superintendent, satisfactory to those who oppose Alderson and favor the proposed measur.

Another thing to remember is that Alderson has declared positively and authorizes the statement that he will not again be a candidate in any case for the county job.

It therefore appears that voting the school measure will not get rid of Alderson but will indirectly add to the taxes of the rural districts around \$7000, or will leave those districts short that much out of the elementary school fund.

Inquiry among school principals, teachers and board members brings out the fact that there is division of sentiment on both Alderson and the advisability of voting the school measure at this time.

Another fact should be kept in mind. Strong influences are at work to enlarge the limits of the city of Portland, perhaps to include all of the county of Multnomah. That would include many if not all of the rural districts in district No. 1 of Portland. What in that case would become of the rural county superintendent's office? Some change of this sort will most likely come about within the next few years.
