FACTORY TIRE TESTS SAVE MOTORING COSTS

"Science has contributed invaluable benefits to the motorists of the country," says Dell Smith, Goodrich tire dealer of Gresham, and he gives out the following information regarding factory tests:

Experimental devices, testing machines and developments in manufacturing processes and compounding have made tires better, longer lasting and cheaper.

In the Goodrich factories at Akron are machines called dynamometers which were developed expressly for the purpose of finding the weak and strong points in a tire. Nine of these machines are in continuous operation day and night, giving a uniformity in tests that could not be obtained in any other way. These machines put conditions upon the tire that parallel the most grueling service to which any tire is ever exposed.

Such tests are applied to both pneumatic tires for passenger cars and pneumatic and solid tires for trucks. Loads as high as ten tons are exerted in the various processes through which tires are continuously sent in the Goodrich factories. A tire can be run to failure on a dynamometer in one-fourth the time required in road testing.

New designs and compounds, new methods of construction are thus given exhaustive tests before they are ever put into production for consumer use. Casings of established sizes and designs are always under dynamometer test. Different tests are made for tread wear than for carcass strength and durability in the interests of balanced construction and strength.

All products that enter into the construction of Goodrich tires are tested at various intervals in the process of manufacture. For instance, every roll of fabric is graded and inspected. Tests establish its uniformity before it is sent into the calender room for coating.

VOTERS! Consider These Recommendations

The majority of voters in the vicinity of Gresham are farmers. Due to the advanced season they are exceptionally busy in their fields, giving little thought to politics, which is of vital importance to them as the men nominated for the various offices on the Republican ticket will, in practically every instance, be elected next fall. **If the farmer fails to take advantage of his privilege to vote in the primaries Friday, May 21, he has no one except himself to blame should a man be elected who is not heart and soul in sympathy with the farmers.** Dealing with farmers and realizing many of their problems, I am writing this article in hopes that they will realize the necessity of turning out in full force and casting a deciding vote in the primaries.

On this page you will find a list of candidates which have been marked for your serious consideration. Space will not permit me to comment on any except the important offices.

First come the nominees for governor. Only two of these candidates deserve our serious consideration, they being I. L. Patterson and William A. Carter. Patterson's slogan we find to be "Will devote all my time to the state's business, not to politics", a very peculiar slogan when we consider that Patterson is the nominee of the machine and has done nothing but play politics for years and judging the future by the past we can only see him playing politics in the years to come. On the other hand Carter's slogan is, "Will apply Coolidge policies to the needs of Oregon", meaning safe, sound and sane business principles.

In Patterson's platform we find a plank "Fish and game commission functioning for the people and not as political machines." It is positively known that Patterson has already agreed to place as game commissioners people who are working for Patterson in this campaign without giving consideration to their qualifications for this position. William A. Carter in various speeches has assured the various sportsmen's organizations of this state that he will place on the Board of Game Commissioners only the men who are recommended by the various sportsmen's organizations of this state. The various sportsmen's organizations are thoroughly familiar with the necessary qualifications of a man capable of fulfilling his obligations to the sportsmen of this state.

Carter is a firm believer in the primary law and will use every effort to keep this law in force, making it impossible for political machines to hand-pick the candidates that you may vote for.

Carter has endorsed the income tax bill as written by the Grange. He owns a farm located at Canby in Clackamas County, this farm being occupied by his brother, a disabled war veteran. He is thoroughly familiar with the farmer's conditions and heartily in sympathy with them.

The next important office is that of United States senator. There are eight candidates for this office, only one of which need be given serious consideration, that being Frederick Steiwer. The Gresham Outlook has made all comments necessary in regard to Mr. Steiwer.

Next we have the candidates for the Third Congressional District. We are heartily in favor of the candidacy of B. F. Mulkey, a man who has had a very broad experience throughout the state of Oregon, is thoroughly familiar with the requirements of all portions of this state, and in addition is a man of very strong character, fully capable of working to the best interests of the people of this state and standing up for his convictions.

Next we have the office of Superintendent of Public Instruction. Here we favor the name of W. C. Alderson, our present county school superintendent, a man who has been doing school work for years, thoroughly familiar with the requirements of the position. We certainly should give W. C. Alderson our serious consideration and our vote.

The next thing of importance and one of great importance to the voters of this community is that of county commissioner. We recommend for your serious consideration the names of Fred G. Buchtel and Thomas H. Hurlburt. On page 3 of the Gresham Outlook issued Friday, May 14, appears an article headed "Hurlburt has good ideas as commissioner", stating his ideas.

Fred G. Buchtel has emphatically stated two things in which we are very much interested. First, he believes that there should be set certain hours on each of four or five days a week in which all three commissioners will be in their offices ready to consult with anyone who has any problem to be placed before the commissioners for their consideration. He also states that in his opinion instead of the immediate spending money for the widening of highways already built that this money should be used in constructing lateral highways connecting up with those already built. The farmers of this community can readily see the common sense of this statement.

You will note on this page that in addition to the men mentioned above there are various other candidates marked whom I believe you should give serious consideration. However, it would require too much space to enlarge on all of these candidates. When going to the polls, do not fail to do this, on Friday, May 21, you will do well to take this list with you and give serious consideration to the names of the men marked as their sympathies in every instance are with this community.
